- Participate in International Lead Poisoning Prevention Week (Week of Action)
- Encourage action on lead paint laws as part of the SAICM Roadmap at the World Health Assembly

NEXT STEPS FOR CARICOM

- Promote commitments to government action on lead paint laws at UNEA3
- Support development of UNEP GEF/SAICM Project to facilitate lead paint laws and regional progress
- Invite CARICOM governments and others to become partners of the Lead Paint Alliance
- Highlight the importance of legal limits at CARICOM meetings, including COTED
- Distribute model law once completed (late Spring 2017)
- Raise awareness especially within the health sector and promote technical cooperation with health and environment ministries
