

Background

- Lead is a cumulative toxicant, especially for pregnant women and young children. No safe levels of lead. Economic loss of USD 135 billion p.a. in Africa 4 % of GDP
- Lead in paint is a major route of exposure particularly for children. Lead paint is still widely available in developing countries.
- Lead Paint Alliance partnering towards the global goal of phasing out lead paint by 2020.



Goals and Objectives of the Workshop

- The overall goal: to advance understanding, commitment and action towards the elimination of lead in paint by 2020.
- Objectives :
 - Share understanding on the health and environmental risks of lead in paint, and foster commitment of governments and stakeholders to address these risks.
 - Exchange information on the government policies and stakeholder actions, and available tools and experiences towards the elimination of lead.
 - Develop strategies for establishing legal limits on lead in paint at national, sub-regional and/or regional levels.
 - Agree on the future action, e.g. follow-up at national policy development, initiating regional process, improvements in toolkit, reporting toward UNEA 2.
