Proposed Edits to the Ministerial Outcome Document	Rationale
(h) We will work towards developing policies and initiatives on defining appropriate and ambitious national targets for reducing waste generation, increasing the reuse of products, and recycling of waste by 2025	To keep the language broad and palatable to all countries
(i) We will decisively address the damage to our ecosystems caused by the unsustainable use and disposal of single-use plastic products, including by phasing-out ensuring proper disposal and treatment of the most problematic-single-use plastic waste products as early as 2025 in line with national priorities, and we encourage the private sector to find affordable and eco-friendly alternatives;"	To focus on proposer disposal and treatment of plastic waste. Also, given the magnitude of the problem, we should not only focus on single-use plastics but all plastic products.
(j) We will support the efforts to develop global products sustainability and circularity criteria by 2025 and we agree to set ambitious <del>national</del> targets <b>or measures where</b> <b>applicable</b> on the use of sustainable public procurements to stimulate demand for environmentally sound products, processes and services;	To provide flexibility to Member States. Suggest to delete "national" as efforts may happen not just at national level but also at sub-national levels.
