## **UN Environment Governance Structure**

**Governed by Mandates in Resolutions and Rules of Procedure** 

#### **United Nations Environment Assembly (UNEA)**

The world's highest-level decision-making body on the environment, established at Rio + 20 in 2012, with a universal membership

UNEA-1: 23-27 June 2014 UNEA-2: 23-27 May 2016 UNEA-3: 4-6 December 2017 UNEA-4: 11-15 March 2019

**UNEA-5: 22-26 February 2021** 

#### **Committee of Permanent Representatives (CPR)**

- Subsidiary inter-sessional body of the Environment Assembly
- Responsible for review and follow-up of the UNEP Programme of Work and UNEA decisions and resolutions
- Composed of 120 member States representatives accredited to UNEP (90 in Nairobi)
- Meets formally 4 times per year usually full-day meetings
- Meets informally as a subcommittee about once per month to address specific issues

#### **Open-Ended CPR Meetings**

- Meets back-to-back with UNEA for 5 days
- Acts as a "PREPCOM" for UNEA
- Pre-negotiates UNEA resolutions
- Next meeting 15-19 February 2021

#### **Annual Subcommittee Meetings**

- Meets annually for 5 days, usually in October
- Reviews and oversights the current PoW
- Provides Guidance on Future PoWs
- Representatives from Capitals attend



## **Functions of the UNEA**

## Governing Council decision 27/2, paragraph 5 (Feb 2013)

- (a) Sets the global environmental agenda;
- (b) Provides overarching policy guidance and defines policy responses to emerging environmental challenges;
- (c) Undertakes policy review, dialogue & exchange of experiences;
- (d) Sets the strategic guidance on the future direction of UN Environment Programme;
- (e) Organizes a multi-stakeholder dialogue sessions;
- (f) Fosters partnerships for achieving environmental goals through resources mobilization.

# **Committee of Permanent Representatives**

#### **History:**

- □ Established May 1985 by GC decision 13/2 in response to the need for a more formal process of consultation among Governments and between the Executive Director and Governments and took into account increasing number of Governments accredited to Nairobi.
- The decision "invite[d] Governments that have not accredited a permanent mission to the Programme to designate a focal point for information & documentation pertaining to meetings of Committee."
- ☐ In April 1997, at its 19<sup>th</sup> session, the Governing Council strengthened the Committee as its subsidiary organ.
- Holds four regular meetings a year. Extraordinary meetings may be convened by Chairperson, after consultation with Bureau members or at the request of at least five members.
- May establish sub-committees, working groups and task forces as deemed appropriate (GC decision 19/32).

## **FUNCTIONS OF THE COMMITTEE**

## **Previously: Derived Mandate from Governing Council decision 19/32**

- ☐ Reviews, monitors and assesses the implementation of decisions of the Council on administrative, budgetary & programme matters within policy and budgetary framework provided by the Governing Council;
- ☐ Reviews the DRAFT Programme of Work & Budget during its preparation by the secretariat;
- ☐ Reviews reports requested of the Secretariat by the Governing Council on the effectiveness, efficiency and transparency of functions and work of the Secretariat & to make recommendations thereon to the Governing Council;
- ☐ Prepares draft decisions for consideration by the Governing Council based on inputs from the secretariat and on the results of the functions specified above.

## **FUNCTIONS OF THE COMMITTEE**

#### **Governing Council decision 27/2, paragraph 9 (Feb 2013)**

countries

- Contribute to the preparation of the agenda of its governing body; Provide advice to its governing body on policy matters; Prepare decisions for adoption by its governing body and oversee their implementation; Convene thematic and/or programmatic debates; Promote effective ways and means to facilitate participation of the nonresident members of the Committee, particularly from developing
- ☐ Perform any other functions delegated to it by its governing body.

## **MEMBERSHIP**

- Representatives all Member States of the United Nations, Specialized Agencies and the European Union, accredited to the UN Environment, based in Nairobi or outside" (GC decision 19/32 Para8).
  - Accredited Members: 116 Member States
  - Non-Member States: Holy See + State of Palestine
  - The European Union
- Observers: League of Arab States + Sovereign Military Order of Malta
- □ 84 accredited missions in Nairobi.

#### **Governing Council decision 27/2, paragraph 10 (Feb 2013)**

"Decides to convene an open-ended meeting of the Committee of Permanent Representatives, while ensuring support to developing countries' representatives, to enable the participation of capital-based delegates as well as stakeholders for a period of five days in an even-year to contribute to preparation of the agenda of its governing body, and to provide advice to its governing body on policy matters."

## **Governing Council decision 27/2, paragraph 11 (Feb 2013)**

"Decides to establish a sub-committee of the Committee of Permanent Representatives that will meet annually for a period of 5 days to review, with the support of the Secretariat, the Medium Term Strategy and Programme of Work & Budget, in a manner coherent with the budgetary biennial cycle of the United Nations, to be endorsed by the Committee of Permanent Representatives and for the governing body's approval, and to oversee their implementation and accountability by the Secretariat."


