Eighth Meeting of the Executive Coordination Panel

I. Introduction

Following the decision taken by the last meeting of the Executive Coordination Panel in Marrakesh, November 2009, its eighth meeting was held on 14-16 February 2010 at the PAP/RAC premises in Split, Croatia. The meeting was chaired by the MAP Officer-in-Charge/Deputy Coordinator and attended by the MED POL Coordinator and the Directors of all Regional Activity Centers (RAC). The list of participants is attached as Annex I to this report.

II. Agenda items 1 and 2

Ms. Silva Mejias, MAP Officer-in-Charge/Deputy Coordinator opened the meeting by pointing out its objectives and the importance of including an outline of the key points of the agenda.

The meeting reviewed and adopted the proposed provisional agenda together including its timetable. The agenda of the meeting is attached as Annex II to this report.

Following the discussion of all agenda items, the meeting concluded on necessary actions and timetables for their implementation as presented below. This report also briefly summarizes key considerations from the discussions held on each agenda item.

III. Agenda items 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9

Agenda Item 4: Main issues

Implementation of programme of work 2010-2011 (2010-2014)

4.i) Calendar of main MAP meetings

Key considerations

The meeting reviewed the proposed list of key MAP meetings for 2010-2011 (UNEP(DEPI)/MED ECP.8/5). It expressed some concerns whether the Contracting Parties meeting should be held in December 2011 due to delays that may be imposed to the finalisation on time of UNEP project documents for the RACs and a smooth start of 2012-2013 PoW implementation.

MAP Components also requested some flexibility with regard to the proposed date of their focal points meetings.

It was pointed out that the calendar of the MAP and Contracting Parties meetings, needs to be designed and agreed well in advance in order to ensure timely preparation/submission of documents/inputs and their dissemination as per rules of procedure.

Agreed Actions and Timetables

4.1 Secretariat to circulate to MAP components a provisional list of documents/inputs for the MAP and Contracting Parties meetings, together with a suggested timetable for their submission once the final decision is made. The host country and the Bureau should be consulted with regard to dates.

May- June 2010

4.2 MAP components to add key meetings, where appropriate, to the proposed calendar of main MAP meeting in order to ensure effective planning and efficient use of resources and continue to submit to the Secretariat, as per established practice, the list of meetings/workshops/training course.

End of March 2010

Some participants expressed potential difficulties regarding the use of videoconference facilities that would enable holding virtual ECP meetings. Info/RAC offered to make a proposal in this regard for ECP consideration.

4.3 Secretariat to prepare a shared calendar of events/meetings within and outside MTF with input from MAP components and Secretariat Programmes.

March 2010

The need to establish a shared calendar of events and or meetings within and outside MTF that may imply MAP involvement and participation was highlighted. 4.4 Info/RAC to make a proposal on video conference facilities for ECP consideration.

April 2010

4.ii) Priorities 2010- 2011

Key considerations

Bearing in mind the need to effectively implement the PoW adopted in Marrakech, the meeting identified a number of expected key achievements/priorities, around which the outputs should be delivered during the biennium.

Agreed Actions and timetables

4.5 ECP agreed on the list of priorities 20102011 as presented in Annex III to this report.

4.iii) Integrated MAP Programme of Work 2010-2011

4.iv) Monitoring and reporting on the implementation of the biannual MAP programme of work

Key considerations

The meeting addressed related agenda sub items of effective planning and reporting together (Documents UNEP(DEPI)/MED ECP.8/3 and UNEP(DEPI)/MED ECP.8/4).

The meeting agreed with the proposal made by the Secretariat with regard to the roles and tasks of Lead and Engaged MAP components. It was also requested that a clear distinction is made between the role of MAP components equally contributing to joint outputs and their role for outputs that should be implemented through cooperation between Lead and Engaged MAP components. In this respect, the meeting defined these roles at output level for the whole programme of work 2010-2011.

The meeting also reviewed the proposed timeline for implementing the outputs during the biennium. It was agreed that further consultation is still needed among components for a number of outputs in order to finalize the timeline, in particular the joint ones. Components should inform the Secretariat of any change in this respect.

The Secretariat informed the meeting that UNEP was pleased with the quality of Project documents submitted.

The meeting appreciated the efforts of the Secretariat to establish a consolidated reporting system for both the reporting on the implementation of the Programme of work

Agreed Actions and timetables

- 4.6 Lead and engaged components to implement the agreed roles for the leading and engaged MAP components as presented in Annex IV to this report.
- 4.7 Lead components to submit to the Secretariat amendments regarding the timeline of planning of joint outputs, following as appropriate, necessary consultations among concerned components.

Mid March 2010

- 4.8 Lead components to implement the 6 month consolidated reporting format as presented in Annex V to this report.
- 4.9 Secretariat *t*o address with the Bureau the need for time wise streamlining of both reporting for the Bureau of the programme of work and reporting for UNEP of project documents.

May 2010

4.10 Secretariat to develop a proposal with regard to an annual reporting template for ECP consideration taking into account the need to avoid to every possible extent a reporting burden and international practises.

September 2010

to MAP governing bodies, namely the Bureau of the Contracting Parties and of the Project documents to UNEP using the reporting-once approach.

However, concerns were expressed with regard to the proposed annual reporting template as well as the template that established the linkage between the 2 and 5-year programmes of work. In particular, the elements that would require the establishment of a proper monitoring system to observe output/budget and staff time allocations linkage was considered a burden.

In this respect, the Secretariat was requested to make further research within UNEP and other conventions with regard to reporting on elements presented in the proposed annual reporting format (baselines, targets, staff allocation).

It was clarified that for the next Bureau meeting in May the Secretariat will sent a MEMO to all components for the preparation of necessary documents.

In addition, the meeting requested the Secretariat to discuss with the Bureau the need for using only one consolidated reporting for both UNEP and the Bureau, including time wise.

4.11 Components and Programmes and Projects to submit progress reports to the Secretariat, for the forthcoming Bureau meeting in May, in English and French as per the 6 month reporting template.

25 March 2010

4.v) Country Agreement Template for the Regional Activity Centres

Key considerations

Ms Silva introduced the agenda item reviewing some substantial provisions contained in the proposed template and providing information on all steps taken for its preparation.

The meeting discussed a number of issues such as: legal implications for the RAC as a national entity with regard to its operational modalities and its financial rules; the role of the Steering committee, relationship between the Steering Committee and the advisory board, the procedure for the recruitment of the Director, difficulties in making the distinction between national experts and international ones; tax exemptions and immunities, delegation of tasks by the Coordinating Unit to the RACs, need to insert a provision on interim implementation, need for a policy on the use of UNEP/MAP logo.

The meeting also found difficult to implement the provision regarding the obligation for the RAC to consult with the Coordinating Unit on consultancy. It was suggested to reformulate this provision in a manner that would provide for policy guidance and other more appropriate tools.

Agreed actions and timetable

- 4.12 The Secretariat suggested the draft template would be amended as per the discussions as follows:
 - a) procedure for nominating the RAC director;
 - consultation with the Coordinating Unit for recruiting consultants to be replaced by policy guidance and post facto evaluations;
 - to allow more flexibility of the composition of the Steering Committee and a better balance between international national representation;
 - d) application of security policy for meetings under MTF, as appropriate;
 - e) and the introduction of interim/transitional implementation provisions until the agreement enters into force.

The meeting appreciated the draft and made some suggestions on the negotiation procedure:

- a) negotiation with countries should take into account specific situations in different RAC countries.
- b) at country level, consultations need to be taken among different departments and institutions.
- it was important to explain the added value of this exercise for those countries for which an agreement between UNEP and the respective governments is already in place.

Ms Silva concluded that the proposed draft is a template that will be negotiated with the countries. Therefore, some of the provisions will be adjusted to country specificities and particularly those related to the Steering Committee and Advisory Board. With regard to the negotiation process, the first draft will be submitted to the Bureau and then the negotiations will start with the concerned countries.

4.13 The Secretariat to draft a policy paper with regard to the use of the logo of UNEP MAP by the RACs.

September 2010

4.vi) Proposed Secretariat tasks with regard to the Offshore and ICZM implementation Protocols

Key considerations

The meeting had an exchange of views on an analysis prepared by a Secretariat consultant (Document UNEP(DEPI)/MED ECP.8/Inf.4) with regard to potential roles and responsibilities of MAP components in facilitating the implementation of the ICZM and Offshore Protocols.

The final result of this exercise would be the identification and allocation of regional responsibilities and tasks to be carried out by MAP components and the Coordinating Unit, as appropriate, subject to decisions of meetings of the Contracting Parties. During the discussions it was pointed out the need to make clear to the Contracting Parties that undertaking new regional roles and carrying out additional tasks by MAP components may affect their programme of work as well as having budgetary implications.

The Components requested more time for reflection with a view to being in a position to make proposals based on both their competencies and the articles under both protocols which provide for regional tasks and roles.

Action and timetable

4.14 Components to submit inputs on the possible contribution of MAP components in facilitating the implementation of both 5.2 Protocols based on their field of competence and mandate.

End of February 2010 (ICZM) First week of March (Offshore)

4.15 Secretariat to consolidate all inputs received for further consideration by the Bureau.

September 2010

4.vii) State of Environment Report

Key considerations

The meeting had a round table discussion on the experience gathered during the process for preparing the SoED report last biennium, lessons learnt, what went well, challenges faced and how to organize the process for the new publication 2010-2011.

The publication of the SoED report 2009 was a great achievement for MAP. It proved that MAP posseses knowledge and necessary internal experience and expertise to produce on time a quality SoED report. The structure and the table of content of the report was proposed on the basis of other experiences on the regional and national level and was decided by the ECP in 2008.

The following lessons learnt in terms of core issues and process were highlighted: the need to further strengthen teamwork, to enhance data collection and better harmonize the structure of the report and to better use indicators based assessment approach.

The concern that the progress achieved every two years is difficult to measure was also highlighted, taking also into consideration that other similar major regional reports are published on a longer frequency basis. Regarding the structure of the new report the following ideas were shared:

- Having a chapter on generalities and a specific theme;
 The specific theme could be a theme where major progress is achieved. The ecosystem approach was proposed as a theme, building on current work on this issue:
- Development issues could be addressed in more depth on a 4 year basis reports than on biennial basis
- Addressing cross-cutting issues and country perspective.
- Indicator-based approach should more thoroughly used for the preparation of the next report.

The meeting highlighted the need to draft a concept note with regard to a possible table of content, report strutcure and a process for report preparation so as to be in a position to plan a timeframe for each specific contribution.

Finally, the meeting agreed that the report should be prepared through a participatory process and that a robust quality assurance process be added, including peer review and consultations with the countries. This process should also be developed in the concept note.

Agreed actions and timetable

4.16 Secretariat in consultation with Blue Plan to circulate to MAP components for inputs a concept note on a possible table of contents (highlighting some options) along the lines of the ECP discussion as well as on the process for its elaboration.

20 March 2010

4.viii) Application of Ecosystem approach by MAP

Key considerations

The Secretariat introducing document UNEP(DEPI)/MED ECP.8/Inf.5 informed the meeting on all steps undertaken to advance the process of assessing the ecological status of the Mediterranean in the framework of the EU/MAP project on the application of ecosystem approach by MAP and implementing the respective decision IG 17/6 of the Contracting Parties. Two consultants were expected to assist the Secretariat as of next week in integrating MAP component inputs for the first pre-assessment reports and facilitating discussion at the technical meeting on this subject to be held in April 2010, hosted by the Italian Ministry of Environment.

The MED POL Coordinator informed the meeting of the intention, following the experience of other regional seas Status Quality reports, to prepare a thematic report on the status of Mediterranean for submission to the next Contracting Parties meeting. Ms Silva highlighted the interest of many Mediterranean countries in a UNEP/MAP MQSR similar to that of OSPAR and linked to the ecosystem approach thus offering integrated pollution, biodiversity and other data on status, pressures and impacts.

The Secretariat drew the attention to MAP involvement in the EU processes with regard to EU Marine Strategy directive which is of a strategic importance in that:

- a) it would enable the needs of the Mediterranean to apply the ecosystem approach.
- Politically, this will strengthen the contribution and the role of MAP in EU processes with a view to ensure that EU standards adequately reflect Mediterranean needs and concerns
- ensuring necessary synergies and avoiding as appropriate that EU and MAP processes unnecessarily go in different directions

Actions and timetable

4.17 MEDPOL, RAC SPA to submit to the Secretariat progress report and first draft of assessment regarding the four areas.

10 March 2010

4.18 Blue Plan to submit to the Secretariat a consolidated report on the total value of marine ecosystems in the Mediterranean.

10 March 2010

4.19 Secretariat, MAP components to prepare the first drafts of the assessment in an integrated manner for submission to the technical meeting on ecosystem approach.

10-23 March 2010

4.20 Secretariat, MAP components to participate in the EU process regarding the application of ecosystem approach/namely marine Strategy Directive in a coordinated manner.

Ongoing

4.21 MED POL to continue leading the developing framework for MQSR which is integrated and linked to Ecosystem Approach.

Ongoing

4.ix) Regional Adaptation Framework

Key considerations

With the view to implementing the Marrakesh Declaration regarding Adaptation to Climate Change, the Secretariat informed the meeting of the status of the preparation of a concept note. The intention is to synergize the work for developing a regional framework to adaptation to climate change with the implementation of the MAP programme of work on climate change, of the newly approved GEF project and the assessment process of the MSSD implementation. The concept note was being drafted following inputs received by the Components in December last year. The proposed process is composed of the following steps;

- a) stocktaking of programmes, institutions, policies knowledge;
- sharing stocktaking findings through a regional workshop;
- c) Preparing a template framework for adaptation to climate change.

The components reported that efforts are being made to include climate change in the ICZM plans under SP Project; Blue Plan has already started relevant activities agreed in the Programme of work.

With regard to MSSD, assessment inputs were requested from all components in the process. REMPEC highlighted the need to consider the implementation of Strategy to combat pollution from ships in the framework of the MSSD assessment process.

Agreed actions and timetable

4.22 Secretariat to share the concept note once finalized with MAP components for their inputs.

May 2010

4.x) Information and Communication Assessment: sharing the first results

Key considerations

The Director of INFO/RAC's made a presentation on the progress made with regard to Information and Communication assessment. The team recruited for the assessment looked very experienced in public relations. Following a question from the floor regarding the expected contribution of the MAP components to this process, it was clarified that it was envisaged that their participation would be through interviews via telephone and filling in of questionnaires.

The meeting took note of the progress achieved. The main points made during the discussions held were:

- The need to be realistic in order to have feasible expectations with regard to achievable goals so as to enhance the opinion of the Parties and the public.
- the need for establishing an Information/ communication network among components and the Contracting Parties.
- To pay attention to public awareness dimension as a very important tool/driving force to enhance public opinion.
- Difficulties that components have in lack of resources to deal with information/communication in an appropriate manner.

MAP Data policy

The Secretariat introduced document UNEP(DEPI)/MED ECP.8/Inf.6. Following discussions the meeting pointed out the different situation of components with regard to data collection and sharing. However, most of them shared the same concerns. Main points made were:

- a) It is important to prepare a consolidated paper on MAP data sharing policy, including an full analyses of legal implications.
- b) There is a need to have an agreement between international organization regarding data sharing.
- c) MAP should not address just data sharing, collection and management. Data generation needs to be tackled properly and in depth.
- d) There is an obvious need to strengthen the collection system of data available and in the long-term to establish the necessary tools and mechanisms to promote data generation by countries.

Agreed actions and timetable

4.23 Info RAC To prepare and share with the Secretariat a draft ToR for establishing a MAP data policy, taking into account the different kind of data generated and managed within MAP and the necessary legal expertise for this exercise to be provided through the Secretariat.

March-June 2010

4.24 Info RAC to draft in the future with inputs from all MAP components a UNEP/MAP policy that should aim at enhancing data generation at country level.

Agenda Item 5: GEF Project(s) and their contribution to the implementation of MAP programme of work

Key considerations

The UNEP/MAP GEF Strategic Partnership Project Manager explained the expected outcome of the Strategic Partnership Steering committee meeting to be held 20-22 february 2010:

- a) approval of the revised Programme of work as per outcome of inception period.
- b) extension of the project.
- the need for quality control of inputs, prepared by Project Partners on the status of Strategic Partnership implementation.

Main points mad during the meeting:

- This project is an excellent opportunity to achieve results on the ground because of the considerable financial resources made available and the integrated way different partners and agencies are supposed to work.
- Strategic Partnership project activities are fully part of MAP Programme of work.
- The governing structure of the Strategic Partnership at the regional and national level should take into account the complexity of existing steering structures already in place. An example was made of the importance of the SAP BIO correspondents for guiding the work in the implementation of the SAP BIO. In this respect it was mentioned that 60% of SAP BIO outputs belong to the national component, out of which 20% belong to the GEF project. As such proliferations should be avoided and the MAP components that are Project Partners should have a central role in ensuring necessary synergies.
- The role of MAP and respective RAC Focal points should be strongly encouraged for this purpose.

Ms Silva concluded that the GEF project being and important project, related progress on its implementation will be an outstanding agenda item of the ECP meeting.

Actions and Timetables

Agenda item 6:Other matters

Key considerations

The meeting was briefed on the outcome of the bilateral meeting in Brussels with the EC DG Environment (General Directorate for Water, Biodiversity and Technologies, Directorate for Enlargement and Neighboured Policies).

The EEA is expected to send a proposal to the Secretariat with regard to MAP participation in SEIS under the H2020.

6.1 Secretariat to share the minutes of the annual MAP/EC meeting with ECP members.

NINTH MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COORDINATION PANEL

Introduction

Following the decision taken by the last meeting of the Executive Coordination Panel in Split, in February 2010 and in line with the decisions of the last Bureau meeting held in Rabat, in May 2010, with regard to back-to-back meetings, the ECP held its ninth meeting on 8-9 July 2010 at the CP/RAC premises in Barcelona, Spain, immediately after the second meeting of experts on ecosystem approach. The meeting was chaired by the MAP Officer-in-Charge/Deputy Coordinator and attended by the MED POL Coordinator and the Directors of all Regional Activity Centers (RACs). The list of participants is attached as Annex I to this report.

Agenda items 1 & 2: Opening of the meeting and adoption of the agenda

Ms Maria Luisa Silva Mejias, MAP Officer-in-Charge/Deputy Coordinator opened the meeting by pointing out its objectives and the importance of including an outline of the key points of the agenda.

The meeting reviewed and adopted the proposed provisional agenda together including its timetable. The agenda of the meeting, as revised, is attached as Annex II to this report.

Following the discussion of all agenda items, the meeting concluded on necessary actions and timetables for their implementation as presented below. This report also briefly summarizes key considerations from the discussions held on each agenda item.

Agenda item 3: Update on recent developments/review of priorities

Key considerations	Actions and Timetable
All components gave a brief exposé of recent developments, highlighting in particular the priorities for the forthcoming six months.	
MED POL reported mainly on some problems in one Contracting Party related to the GEF project/PCB. <i>Key priorities were:</i> - Baseline budget updated including the methodology - Legally binding measures on mercury and biodiversity from food sector - ECAP assessment - QSR preparation	
REMPEC informed the meeting on GEF UNDP IMO partnership, the need to develop action plans and for the Globallast Convention to be ratified. Strategy was drafted and requests will be submitted to countries to consider an interim voluntary ballast water exchange regime. An information system on invasive species is to be established that is meant to facilitate risk assessment by coastal states when confronted to a ship which ballast has not been exchanged prior to its arrival. The need to form a steering committee was highlighted as this information system could serve several types of end-users with different needs and requirements . SPA/RAC is fully involved. MOON is also interested and the information is also part of the IMO GISIS tool. Key priority: To ask for the support of the Contracting Parties for the voluntary interim harmonized regime to be introduced in the Mediterranean sea sasp.	

BP/RAC reported that its work to nourish the Marseille centre with studies on cost of degradation and socio economic analysis was ongoing. - BP/RAC has also worked on developing durability criteria for urban project in the framework of urban ministerial meeting of the UfM next year. Key priorities were: - Rivers Debit in the Mediterranean basin in respect of agriculture use - Organization of focal points meeting PAP/RAC reported on ICZM Strategies in 2 countries: Albania and Algeria and CAMP in four countries: Italy, France, Montenegro and Spain. A working group has been established with GPW, SPA and UNESCO on converging methodologies within ICZM. Policy note on ICZM with regard to implementation of the Protocol is under development. Following discussions suggestions were made to undertake an assessment of CAMP projects. Key priorities were: - Explanatory guide of the ICZM Protocol - Stocktaking exercise - CAMP - MED Partnership project ICZM component SPA/RAC informed the meeting for the COP CBD and SPA/RAC/MAP participation. Progress was reported on preparing the 4th Mediterranean symposium on marine vegetation. It was suggested to address the blue carbon issue in the symposium, by inviting papers on these subjects. Key priorities were: - Implementing Endangered Species Action Plans - Carry out periodic SPAMI evaluation for 5-6 SPAMI; - Contribution to the implementation of the ECAP project; - Creation of the SPAMI in the high seas including deep sea; - Implementation of the Mediterranean Marine Protected Areas Network (MedMPANet) project. CP/RAC informed the meeting that the work was focused on streamlining SCP in national policies: A preliminary mission was undertaken by CP/RAC, Coordinating Unit and DTIE in Croatia. CP/RAC has carried out capacity building activities on NAP priorities which were held in Tunisia and soon in Lebanon. A number of projects had started, including the update of CP methodologies so as to take into account energy efficiency. Kev priorities were: - SCP streamline in national policies - Capacity building in NAP priorities - Legally binding measures - Update CP methodologies to take into account energy efficiency

INFO/RAC provided information on GEF Strategic Partnership project related activities and institutional issues related to handover process.

Key priorities were:

INFO/MAP reporting system, GEF Project communication component.

Agenda Item 4: Communication Strategy

Key considerations

The first day of the ECP was devoted to the presentation of the report on information and communication activities, which had been assigned to the Public Affairs Agency Weber Shandwick.

The report had been distributed previously to the participants, and the meeting opened with a brief introduction by Ms Silva and a power point presentation by Sheila Rezdepi, Weber Shandwick, followed by a plenary discussion on the main findings and recommendations of the assessment.

In terms of developing the main points of the strategy (key issues and target groups; success stories; platforms), it was the first time that such exercise was successfully conducted in a coordinated manner with the active input of all RACs and MAP Coordinating Unit.

During the conclusion session, participants identified staff members within RACs and programmes who would be appointed as communication focal points to participate in the follow up and support of communication activities within the MAP network. A first conference call of the communication focal points network is to be scheduled before the end of July 2010 (NB: took place on 21st July; next scheduled 1st September).

Conclusions

The ECP Meeting:

- a) Endorsed the strategy presented, which focuses on the concept of Unify- Mobilise-Inspire, and nominated focal points for communication with the RACs.
- b) Concluded with a list of short-term outputs to be coordinated and/or developed by the MAP Information Officer in cooperation with MAP programme officers and RAC' communication focal points:
- Set up and functioning of the Comms Network across RACs and components;
- Audiences matrix;
- Spokesperson ressources matrix;
- List of top 10 NGOs/key partners for MAP communication
- c) Agreed on the communication focal points:

d) To hold a first conference call of the communication focal points network is to be scheduled before the end of July 2010

Other issues related to communication

During the plenary discussions, it was underlined that MAP needs to focus less on traditional press conferences, as they do not work unless the speaker is a key public figure. It was suggested to look into web events to "dematerialise" communication and make virtual attendance possible.

Discussions also focused on the forthcoming Nagoya COP in Japan (October 2010). Information concerning the tentative booking of a side event for MAP component was provided, and it was agreed that a concept note and a political statement would be drafted by SPA/RAC to be reviewed by MAP partners (IUCN and WWF), and the MAP Secretariat.

The issue of the information stand at the Regional Seas pavilion, and the related information material and activities was also raised. INFO/RAC indicated that they were working on the development of a media strategy for the event that would be circulated shortly, and some suggestions were made. It was agreed that the communication should be focused and given the short time left to prepare it, information on existing materials on biodiversity issues within RACs would be sent to INFO/RAC and the Secretariat to make a selection of what is available and what is needed.

Agenda Item 5: Application of ISO Standards

Key considerations

Ms Silva pointed out that both initiatives (application of ISO standards and CP/RAC audit measures) were well received by the Bureau and encouraged a wide application within MAP components. She added that this would be a very good sign to the Contracting Parties, particularly in view of the financial crisis.

Mr Thibault in his presentation, outlined the main elements of application of ISO by BP/RAC, the objective of which was to establish a quality management system for the centre. The full presentation is attached as Annex III to this report. It is important to note that a set of indicators were generated to measure the quality of outcome/products, the quality of the organization performance and the quality of communication policy and practices and tools

Actions and Timetable

To agree that as a first step the Secretariat may identify some common processes with ECP workflow, further reflect on them and come up with some ideas and paper for the next ECP meeting in October 2010.

During discussions it was clarified that going through ISO or another quality management system could improve the ECP internal communication and MAP's coordination system. ISO is rational for more structured firms, more than 40 employees with internal 'piramidal' structure of responsibilities. Not appropriate for small Centres like majority of MAP RACs are.

A pre audit that would assist the ECP to identify and describe procedures to implement common processes in view of fulfilment of its mandate would be very helpful because it would advise on necessary steps to go forward.

Agenda Item 6: Sustainability at Meetings - Recommendations for the Greening of MAP Meetings

Key considerations

A presentation was made by Roger Garcia Noguera, CP/RAC Deputy Director, (Annex IV), on ways and means to green MAP meetings, which was particularly welcomed by the meeting.

Following discussions, it was pointed out that there are practices already implemented by MAP with a view to enhancing the cost effectiveness of meetings, for example the preparation of post-session meeting reports.

INFO/RAC suggested to focus on the programme of work agreed in Marrakesh with regard to the dimension of ICT and how INFO/RAC could help us with ICT and video conferences.

While appreciating all criteria for greening MAP meetings, it was pointed out to take into account the need for interaction with other elements such as cost effectiveness and Secretariat service quality and in particular the implementation of rules of procedures for meetings and conferences as adopted by the Contracting Parties.

Actions and Timetable

- a) To agree that CP/RAC should lead MAP efforts to greening its meetings and each RAC should appoint a contact point.
- b) A group composed of CP/RAC and Coordinating Unit representatives to prepare by September 2011 a "to do list" with actions to be implemented in 2010 and 2011.
- c) It should also be clarified as to country responsibilities for hosting meetings so it is clear that some costs may also be shared.

Agenda Item 7: Review of Bureau 70 Decisions

Key considerations

Ms Silva reviewed document ECP/9/3 that described some tasks for implementing Bureau decisions and invited the components to complete the information on precise tasks and responsibilities. Following discussion the table was agreed as proposed on some issues and completed with new elements.

Actions and Timetable

To agree on tasks and timetables for implementing the decisions of the Bureau as presented in Annex V to this report.

Agenda item 8: Other matters

Key considerations

MISED development

Mr Thibault made the presentation clarifying the most important elements of the system, pointing out that MISED will be operational on 15 September 2010.

The meeting particularly welcomed this important development for MAP and discussed ways and means to accelerate the work with regard to INFO/MAP.

- INFO/MAP will be developed at regional level MAP components and at country level too.
- INFO/MAP at the end will be a catalogue for the system a portal of Med information.
- -MED POL expressed its regret because the MEDPOL info system is not yet concluded because of administrative problems with the previous INFO/RAC.

Financial issues

Ms Silva shared with the ECP the informal communication from Headquarters that investigations were carried out to assess whether the MTF had incurred a deficit. Pending confirmation and clarification it was suggested to establish a saving policy in order to be prepared to overcome related difficulties, as need be.

The next ECP meeting will be held 19-20 October 2010 in Rome, Italy. The meeting will start at 15.00 hrs.

Actions and Timetable

By September the MAP reporting system should be on-line by Sep 2010.

INFO/RAC to share a roadmap to develop INFO/MAP by September 2010.

To decide upon requested actions once the shortfall is assessed,

The Secretariat to contact the Ministry of Environment of Italy for hosting the next ECP meeting.

Agenda Item 9: Wrap-up of Meeting Conclusions

Ms Silva wrapped up some key conclusions of the meeting. The report of the meeting will be communicated by e-mail.

Agenda Item 10: Closure of the meeting

Ms Silva closed the meeting at 18.00 hrs.
