African Ministerial Conference on Environment (AMCEN) processes on "African Ocean Governance Strategy"

African Ministerial Conference on the Environment (AMCEN)

- AMCEN established in 1985 as a forum to promote regional cooperation in addressing environment issues
- Outcomes reported AU STC on Agriculture, Rural Development, Water and Environment, Executive Council and Summit
- Outcomes also feed into UNEA, other regional and global fora, institutions and partners
- Regular sessions held every 2 years 15th session in 2015 16th session for August 2017 in Libreville, Gabon. Special sessions convened 6th special session held in 2016
- AMCEN Bureau ensures political and intersessional continuity and regional balance

AMCEN 2015/2016: Outcomes on ocean issues

Key elements of the "Cairo Declarations" of 2015 and 2016:

- •Regional seas programmes in Africa as regional platforms for implementing Africa Integrated Marine Strategy 2050, Agenda 2063 on Ecosystem-Based Management Approaches for marine resources in EEZ and adjacent waters;
- •Development of an <u>ocean governance strategy</u>, in accordance with UNCLOS and RSC, for effective management of Africa's shared maritime resources;
- •AMCEN 15 held under the overall theme of "harnessing natural Capital" with oceans as part of theme
- •AMCEN SS6 agreed to <u>strengthen existing regional institutional</u> <u>mechanisms</u> in Africa for ecosystem based management of oceans and coastal zones and called upon UN Environment and partners within their respective mandates to organize a <u>conference on oceans in 2017.</u>
- •First Planning Meeting Istanbul, October 2015 4 Regional Seas, UNEP agreed approaches and on scoping study

Next Steps

2017

- An overview and scoping study/ gap analysis (on-going) to be completed by June 2017
- Engaging new leadership at AU- from April
- Use existing opportunities/events to advance Africa's ocean governance Objective: political buy-in, create awareness, mobilise and consult member states and stakeholders
- PrepCom of UN Ocean Conference in New York, February side sessions
- SDG High Level Political Forum in June side sessions and Africa Group of Permanent Representatives in New York
- Our oceans Conference, Malta October side sessions
- 19th RS Global meeting, South Africa, November experts session
- Regional Seas to inform and mobilise member states on overall Africa ocean governance initiative and have governance expert reviews (possibility of preparing own ocean governance frameworks)

2017

- UNEA 3 December side sessions
- AU Summit in July, Addis Ababa side sessions
- AMCEN16, August, ½ day experts review, stakeholder consultations and report progress
- Resource mobilisation fundraising concept (to include coordinator of the process), identify potential partners including financial institutions, foundations and bilaterals
- Draft ocean governance strategy 2 months after AMCEN16

2018

- Africa ocean governance conference (to be decided at AMCEN16)
- Continue with High level engagements
- Engage AU through AMCEN for political adoption
- Prepare plan of action for implementation of Ocean Governance Strategy
