

## Speaker Biographies

### *Marcos Orellana*



Marcos A. Orellana is the Director of CIEL's (Centre for International Environmental Law) Human Rights and Environment Program. Prior to joining CIEL, Dr. Orellana was a Fellow to the Lauterpacht Research Centre for International Law of the University of Cambridge, UK. He also was a visiting scholar with the Environmental Law Institute in Washington DC. Previously, Dr. Orellana was Instructor Professor of international law at the Universidad de Talca, Chile and a consultant to various international governmental and non-governmental organizations. He has also provided legal counsel to the Chilean Ministry of Foreign Affairs on international environmental issues, and in that capacity has joined official delegations to meetings of select MEAs.

### *Ibrahim Thiaw*



Mr. Ibrahim Thiaw is the Deputy Executive Director for the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and Assistant-Secretary-General of the United Nations. Following the decision of Rio +20 to strengthen and upgrade UNEP, Mr. Thiaw continues to play a critical role in the implementation of UNEP's mandate and its Medium Term Strategy and Programme of Work, as well as catalyzing UNEP's political engagement with governments and intergovernmental processes on the first and further sessions of the United Nations Environmental Assembly. Mr. Thiaw's role also includes advancing the on-going internal performance and reform agenda. Prior to his appointment as Deputy Executive Director Mr. Thiaw served as the Director of the Division of Environmental Policy Implementation (DEPI). As Director for DEPI, Mr. Thiaw was responsible for conceptualizing and managing UNEP's activities in two of its core thematic areas of focus - ecosystem management and services and conflicts and disasters.

*Jiri Hlavacek*



Jiri Hlavacek took on his responsibility as Secretary of the Governing Bodies in UNEP on 1 February 2014 and had served as Deputy Director of the Division of Regional Cooperation until October 2013 to then become Chief of the Regional Support Office. Jiri worked with the Ministry of the Environment of the Czech Republic in (1996-2011) in key senior positions, including as the Director General for International Relations and Deputy Minister for International Environmental Affairs and Sustainable Development Agenda. He played an instrumental role in establishing the Government Council for Sustainable Development (2003) and the National Strategy of Sustainable Development in the Czech Republic (2004). Internationally, Jiri was elected to numerous leadership positions in governing bodies of multilateral environmental agreements and intergovernmental bodies, including of the Conferences of the Parties to the UN Convention to Combat Desertification, the Meetings of the Parties to the Montreal Protocol on Substances that Deplete the Ozone Layer, the Preparatory Committee for the UN Conference on Sustainable Development (Rio+20) and the Environment Policy Committee of OECD and UN Economic Commission for Europe.

Previously, Jiri worked in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs (1982-1996), having been assigned to posts in Tanzania, Somalia and finally in Kenya, where he served as the Head of the Embassy and the Permanent Representative to UNEP and UN-Habitat. Jiri is the author and co-author of many articles on issues ranging from sustainable development to African history and politics, e.g. “Framework of Programmes on Sustainable Consumption and Production of the Czech Republic”, “The Czech Republic and Africa”, “International Environmental Law and Environment Protection”, “The Environment for Europe process: Successes and Challenges”

*Alexander Juras*



Alexander Juras, previously the Deputy Director of UNEP's Division for GEF Coordination is currently the Chief of UNEP's Major Group and Stakeholder Branch that is in charge of enhancing engagement and collaboration of UNEP with Major Groups actors who share the same purpose around the world, involving them at the policy level to take into account their expertise and views, and on the programmatic level in implementation of UNEP's work program. Before joining UNEP, he worked as a research fellow at the Bonn based Institute for European Environmental Policy, then for many years as the Deputy Director of the Regional Environmental Center for Central and Eastern Europe and as the Deputy Director of the Regional Environmental Center for Central Asia, located in Kazakhstan.

Besides organizational management, his work focused on civil society development and multi stakeholder involvement in environmental matters, environmental information, development and administration of grants programs for various stakeholders and regional and global environmental cooperation.

*Achim Steiner*



Acting on the nomination of Secretary-General Kofi Annan, the UN General Assembly in 2006 unanimously elected Achim Steiner as the Executive Director of UNEP. On the proposal of the Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon, Mr. Achim Steiner was re-elected as Executive Director of the United Nations Environment Programme for another four-year term. The Secretary-General also appointed Mr. Steiner as Director-General of the United Nations Office at Nairobi (UNON), where he served from March 2009 to May 2011.

Before joining UNEP, Mr. Steiner served as Director General of the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN) from 2001 to 2006, and prior to that as Secretary General of the World Commission on Dams. He worked both at grassroots level as well as at the highest levels of international policy-making to address the interface between environmental sustainability, social equity and economic development.

Mr. Steiner also chairs two UN system wide entities including HLCP - High-level Committee on Programmes of the United Nations System Chief Executives Board for Coordination (CEB) and EMG - United Nations Environment Management Group.

### ***Elizabeth Mrema***



Elizabeth Mrema has worked with the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) for almost two decades. From July 2009 to January 2013 she was the Executive Secretary of the UNEP/Secretariat of the Convention on the Conservation of Migratory Species of Wild Animals (CMS), Acting Executive Secretary of the UNEP/ASCOBANS and Interim Executive Secretary of the UNEP/Gorilla Agreement all based in Bonn, Germany. Since January 2013 she has been the Deputy Director and Coordinator, Operations and Programme Delivery Branch in the Division of Environmental Policy Implementation (DEPI) and was recently appointed as Director to the Division of Environmental Law and Conventions in UNEP.

Previously, Elizabeth's work at UNEP had focused on the development, implementation and enforcement environmental laws both at national, regional and international level. She has played different roles in UNEP over the years which include being a Coordinator of capacity building and compliance and enforcement projects related to environmental law and the multilateral environmental conventions. She had been a Senior Legal Officer and Chief of the Multilateral Environmental Agreements (MEAs) Support and Cooperation Branch in the then Division of Environmental Conventions (DEC). Then a Senior Legal Officer and later Principal Legal Officer and Chief of the Biodiversity/Land Law and Governance Branch in the UNEP Division of Environmental Law and Conventions (DELIC).

*Daniel Magraw*



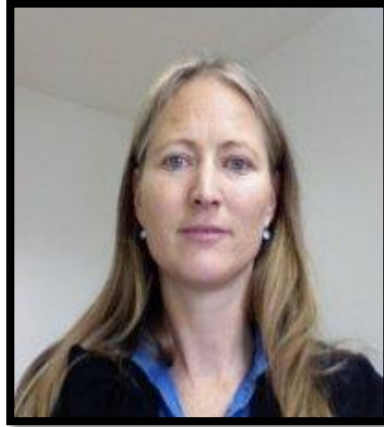

He has extensive experience in international law, institutions, processes and policies, particularly relating to environmental protection and human rights, including having worked in government, non-governmental organization (NGOs), inter-governmental organizations, business, and academia. Dan has served as an MGFC member representing the NGOs for some years. He was a member of the Trade and Environment Policy Advisory Committee to the Office of the U.S. Trade Representative (TEPAC), chairs the American Bar Association (ABA) Section of International Law's Task Force on Magna Carta and serves as a consultant to the United Nations. He was a former member of the U.S. Department of State Study Group on International Business Transactions.

Maryam Nyamir-Fuller is currently the Special Advisor to the Executive Director on Post 2015 and Sustainable Development Goals. She was formerly the Director of the Division of Global Environment Facility Coordination (DGEF) of UNEP. She brings to UNEP 27 years of experience in the technical areas of sustainable rural development and environmental management in Africa, West Asian, Asia and Latin American, including work with USAID, several UN agencies and International NGOs. Maryam also has seven years of experience with the GEF, and since 2003, as Principal Technical Advisor for UNDP's GEF Unit in the Focal Area of Land Degradation, and head of the Sustainable Land Management Team.

*Sascha Gabizon*



Sascha Gabizon is the Executive Director of WECF - Women in Europe for a Common Future. In 1994 she joined WECF to prepare the contribution to the 4th World Women's Conference in Beijing in 1995. Since 1996 she has been the executive director of the WECF network, which she developed and its international activities with a special focus on the EU, Eastern Europe and Central Asia. Currently there are 3 management offices (Netherlands, Germany, France), serving as secretariats for the network activities. Sascha Gabizon worked for an international consultancy in Spain and then joined the Wuppertal Institute for Climate, Energy and Environment (WI), in Germany, where she was the co-founder of the Wuppertal Institute's "FrauenWissen" (Women's Scientists).

*Neville Ash*



Neville Ash is Deputy Director of UNEP's Division of Environmental Policy Implementation, and also heads up UNEP's work on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services, including the work on wildlife trade. He recently led the process for the establishment and initial operationalization of the Intergovernmental Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES), for which he was the interim Executive Secretary.

Before joining UNEP in 2010, he worked as head of the IUCN ecosystem management programme, and before that with UNEP's World Conservation Monitoring Centre, where he was head of the ecosystem assessment programme. He has worked on a range of international assessment initiatives, on developing the ecosystem-based climate change adaptation agenda, and on various species, trade and policy issues, and has conducted wildlife research and management projects in Europe, Africa and Asia.

*Susan Brown*



Susan Brown is Director, Global and Regional Policy, WWF International. In this role she is responsible for leading and facilitating research, policy and advocacy across a broad range of issues and multilateral dialogues. The WWF Network has a presence in around 100 countries, has 5,000 staff and a conservation spend of around CHF 500M per year. During her 9 years at WWF, Susan has led delegations, positioning and content for policy dialogues such as MDGS, SDGs, CBD, UNGA processes, Rio+20, APEC, ASEAN, G20, OECD and other high level panels, summits and events. She created the Hot House research and advocacy unit and developed measures to increase coherence on WWF policy engagement across countries, regions and programmes in the areas of economics, security and strategic issues, development, biodiversity, social issues, trade and health. Previously, Susan spent 5 years as a journalist - publishing environment, political, governance, economic, Indigenous and legal articles in the form of news, feature, opinion and analysis pieces in most of Australia's major broadsheet newspapers and a number of legal, business and other journals.

*Peter Cruickshank*



Peter Cruickshank is a project coordinator at the United Nations Environment Programme Finance Initiative. He has worked on the Natural Capital Declaration, a partnership between UNEP Finance Initiative (Geneva, Switzerland) and Global Canopy Programme (Oxford, UK) to host a coalition of financial institutions committed to embedding natural capital issues into the way they do business. By showing the link between environmental issues and the cost of capital, credit risk, and financial statements, the project aims to better demonstrate the business case for green finance. He was an

assistant Organiser and Rapporteur with CITES (the Convention of International Trade of Endangered Species)' MIKE (Monitoring the Illegal Killing of Elephants) Programme at CITES COP 16 in Bangkok, 2013, and IUCN's African Elephant Specialist Group' African Elephant Summit, Botswana, December 2013.

***Brian Flannery***



In semi-retirement Dr. Flannery collaborates with scientists at the Joint Global Change Research Institute and as a Center Fellow at Resources for the Future. He also continues to participate in the international climate and energy arena, serving as chair of the Business Engagement Task Force of the Major Economies Business Forum and of the Green Economies Dialogue project. He received degrees in astrophysics from Princeton and the University of California Santa Cruz, and pursued research at The Institute for Advanced Study and as professor at Harvard University. He is co-author of the widely used reference Numerical Recipes: the Art of Scientific Computing.

***Norine Kennedy***



With over 20 years' experience as United States Council for International Business's lead environment, energy and climate change expert, Norine Kennedy promotes U.S. business participation in international environmental policy and management initiatives, and works closely with industry, government and NGOs to promote sustainable development and



green growth. She also spearheads USCIB's strategic international engagement initiative, which seeks to advance meaningful business participation and regulatory diplomacy in inter-governmental organizations, and focuses on increasing accountability of international institutions regarding business interests.

In addition to staffing USCIB's 120 company Environment Committee, Kennedy represents business in environmental discussions at the UN and OECD. She was a business observer at the UN's 1992 Earth Summit in Rio and served on the U.S. delegation to the Rio+20 summit in 2012. She regularly participates in meetings of the UN Environment Programme and UN deliberations on the Sustainable Development Goals and Post-2015 Development Agenda, and in negotiating sessions for the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change.

Kennedy joined USCIB in 1991, having served at the World Environment Center as project manager in its corporate programs department. She holds a master's degree in international environmental policy from Claremont Graduate School, and a bachelor's degree in international relations from Wellesley College.
