



Status of achievement of indicator targets in the Programme of Work




The figures in the bar chart represent the number of indicator targets

Selected Highlights of UNEP support Jan 2018 – Jun 2019

- **SP1:** Assets managed under a low-carbon mandate = \$51 billion.
- **SP2:** Reducing risks to natural disasters, e.g. flood and drought management in Burkina Faso, Thailand and Uganda.
- **SP3:** Transboundary elephant conservation and management in the Kavango-Zambezi Conservation Area.
- **SP4:** Integration of environmental priorities in country UNDAFs/UNSDCFs.
- **SP5:** Countries and regions are taking action on marine litter.
- **SP6:** Countries and businesses are adopting more resource efficiency policies and practices, e.g. sustainable tourism.
- **SP7:** Timeliness of the science made available by UNEP for decision-making, e.g. GEO-6 or the World Environment Situation Room.
