UPDATE BY THE SECRETARIAT ON THE EXTENDED FUNCTIONAL REVIEW

Update by the Secretariat on the Extended Functional Review

I. MEDITERRANEAN CONTACT GROUP

Further to item 3 "Extended Functional Review", paragraph 24, page 7 of the report by the Secretariat on specific issues (UNEP/BUR/75/4/Cor.1), and with reference to the Annex V "Draft Terms of Reference for the Contact Group of Extended Functional Review", of the same document, page 2, regarding the composition of the Mediterranean Contact Group (MCG), the Secretariat would like to propose the following names (in alphabetical order) as possible members of MCG.

1. M. Mohamed Benyahia (Morocco)

Former President of the Bureau for Barcelona Convention (2010 – 2011), currently the Director of Partnership, Communication and Cooperation under the Department of Environment of Ministry of Energy, Mines, Water and Environment.

2. David Johnson (United Kingdom)

David Johnson, Executive Secretary to the OSPAR Commission for the last six years, is an Emeritus Professor of Coastal Management at Southampton Solent University. During these years, the OSPAR Commission has carried out seminal work on the Marine Strategy Framewok Directive (MSFD). After time as a Royal Navy officer, countryside conservation trainer and an environmental consultant he became a full-time academic in 1992. He is currently a Professional Reviewer for the Chartered Institute of Water and Environmental Management and for several years was a maritime adviser to WWF. The research projects he was involved include a successful trigovernmental feasibility study to evaluate the potential of the Wadden Sea as a Particularly Sensitive Sea Area: Coastlearn an EU project developing web-based materials for distance learning in coastal zone management; and New Epoc an Interreg IIIc project sharing good practice between ten European partner ports in order to address future challenges. His recent journal papers have been produced for the Journal of Coastal Conservation, Marine Policy and the Journal of Sustainable Tourism. David's most recent book contribution comprises a jointly authored chapter in Ocean Yearbook 20 published by the International Ocean Institute (2006).

3. Janez Pobodnik (Slovenia)

Janez Pobodnik was the Minister for Environment from 2004 to 2008, and now the director of ECPD International Institute for Sustainable Development, Urban Planning and Environmental Studies in Slovenia. He studied medicine at the University of Ljubljana, where he graduated in 1984. He entered politics during the period of democratization known as the Slovenian spring. In 1990, he joined the Slovenian People's Party and became elected as first non-Communist mayor of Idrija after World War II. In 1992, he was elected to the Slovenian National Assembly. Podobnik served as chairman of the National Assembly (1996–2000). He was re-elected to the Parliament in 2000, and served as the head of the parliament group of the Slovenian People's Party between 2000 and 2004. In 2003, he was elected as president of the Slovenian People's Party.

4. Najib Saab (Lebanon)

Najib Saab is an architect by training, and currently publisher and Editor-in-Chief of Al-Bia Wal-Tanmia (Environment & Development), the leading pan-Arab magazine on sustainable development and Secretary General of Arab Forum for Environment & Development (AFED). He has a varied experience, ranging from designing for multinationals and lecturing on corporate architecture at the American University of Beirut, to advising various governments and agencies on environment and writing on sustainable development and technology. He is a 2003 laureate of the United Nations Environment Programme's Global 500 Award for environmental achievement, and in 2011 was awarded Zayed International Prize for the Environment. Saab has ten books to his credit, including Nature Book which received in 2002 the Book of the Year Award from the Beirut Arab Book Fair. He is co-editor, with Mostafa Tolba and Mohamed El-Ashry, of the annual reports on the State of the Arab Environment published by AFED.

5. Mostafa Kamal Tolba (Egypt)

Mostafa Kamal Tolba (born in 1922) is an Egyptian scientist most famous for his 17-year tenure as Executive Director of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) between 1975 and 1992. Tolba graduated from Cairo University in 1943, and obtained a PhD from Imperial College London five years later. He established his own school in microbiology at Cairo University's Faculty of Science, and also taught at the University of Baghdad during the 1950s. Tolba led Egypt's delegation to the landmark 1972 Stockholm Conference, which established the United Nations Environment Programme. Tolba became UNEP's Deputy Executive Director right after the conference, and two years later was promoted to Executive Director. During his long tenure (1975–1992), he played an important role in the fight against ozone depletion, which culminated with the Vienna Convention (1985) and the Montreal Protocol (1987).
