## **Agenda Item 2: Consideration of the agenda, structure format, modalities and side events for UNEA 5.2**

This note, entitled "Recommended list of official side events for UNEA-5.2 and the special session on UNEP@50", serves as a background document for consideration under agenda item 2 - Consideration of the agenda, structure format, modalities and side events for UNEA 5.2.

The note includes a recommended list of official side events for the resumed session of UNEA-5.2 and the special session on UNEP@50.

Following an open call issued in August 2021 to UN Member States, UN entities, including the Multilateral Environmental Agreements, and major groups and stakeholders accredited to the UN Environment Programme, a total of **174 side event applications** were received by the secretariat through a dedicated online application portal by the deadline of 31 October 2021. This record number of applications demonstrates a very high interest by all stakeholders from all parts of the world to contribute to these milestone events.

Following the submission of applications, the secretariat has reviewed and assessed the contributions applying a thorough selection process that has aimed to identify lead organizers for a limited number of high-profile side events. This process resulted in the shortlisting of a total of **20 official side events for UNEA-5, and 2 official side events for UNEP@50**. The recommended side events have been selected with a view to ensure a broad geographical representation of stakeholders, a high potential to add value to the UNEA sessions, as well a high-level resonance in relation to the overall theme for UNEA-5 – "*Strengthening actions for nature to achieve the Sustainable Development Goals*". More specifically, the following criteria have been applied in the selection process:

1. **Thematic consideration:** The theme of the side event should relate to the theme of the fifth session of the Environment Assembly, also taking into account the guidance outlined in the [background note underlying the choice of the theme](#) by the UNEA Bureau in December 2019; or focus on the special session on UNEP@50.
2. **Compelling speakers and audience engagement:** The side event should, as far as possible, ensure an interactive and engaging dialogue with panel members and/or the audience with a moderator that has a background in hosting such events to ensure a compelling event within the allocated time.
3. **Representation:** The design and structure of the side event should facilitate broad stakeholder participation and should, where relevant, include representatives from the civil society, the private sector and the scientific community, and the choice of lead speakers / contributors / panelists to the event lists should to the extent possible be geographically, generationally and gender balanced and should generally not exceed six people.

4. **Outreach and communications:** Priority has been given to side events that are co-sponsored by two or more entities/ partners, that have a dynamic and strong communications / media component built into the event that serves to raise the profile of the issue and ergo UNEA 5.2.

The shortlisting was carried out in two phases, whereby a longlist was created based on the above-mentioned established criteria. In a second phase, the longlist was assessed by senior management representatives from across the UNEP secretariat, to select the best applications to arrive at the final shortlist. The proposed official side events for special session on UNEP@50 was subject to a separate process led by the UNEP@50 coordination team.

In addition to the shortlist, about 60 additional proposals from the longlist were identified as potential contributors to the selected side events, within 4 thematic clusters that address the same or similar topics. On this basis, the organizers of the selected side events will – with the support of the secretariat – be invited to reach out to the other applicants in each cluster to explore possible cooperation to enhance the quality and ownership of the final side event, with potentially higher impacts. Such an approach can lead to broader engagement among key stakeholders and may spur new forms of cooperation across Member States and organizations that go beyond the organization of a single event.

The approach may require additional efforts of outreach and coordination among different stakeholders, which UNEP will help facilitate, as appropriate. UNEP will also provide guidance and support to secure an adequate stakeholder, gender and generational balance for the side events panels.

Following review and possible further guidance provided by the UNEA and CPR Bureau at its meeting on 8 December, the successful applicants will be informed by the secretariat in December.

With regard to the specific distribution of events in time and space, the secretariat will need more time to prepare a fully-fledged program. The programming will take into account the guidance provided in the agreed [Outcome of the Process for review by the CPR](#). Thus, the secretariat will aim for “*an optimal balance between political negotiations, the UNEA high-level segment, and official and non-official UNEA events, to ensure political ownership and to enable, as far as possible, all Member States to participate in the negotiations on UNEA resolutions, by rationalizing the number of side events and other events, and avoiding overlaps in the scheduling and structure of UNEA sessions.*” This means that no official side events will take place at the same time as formal meetings, and that only a limited number of side events will be organized in parallel.

While most side events will be organized fully online, the secretariat is also exploring options for a limited number of high-profile side events to take place in a hybrid format from the UN conference rooms. Some events may also be pre-recorded / produced for transmission in advance. Furthermore, a “green room” may be set up which will facilitate possible high-level participation by virtual means directly from the UN compound during UNEA-5.2 and UNEP@50.

Finally, the secretariat will seek to ensure that the official UNEA side events reach as large an audience as possible, through effective promotion and communication on UNEP’s main website and social media platforms, and by reaching out to UNEP partners, goodwill ambassadors, and others.

Members of the two Bureaux are invited to endorse the proposed selection of official side events for the resumed session of UNEA-5 and the special session on UNEP@50, in accordance with established practices for previous UNEA sessions, and provide possible additional guidance for the organization of the side events.
