FAITH GROUPS RESPOND

<u>Stockholm+50</u> marks the 50th anniversary of the UN's Summit on the Human Environment, which was the UN's first major conference on international environmental concerns held in 1972.

In that context, representatives from the World Council of Churches, FaithPlans, Faith Invest, the Act Church of Sweden, Brahma Kumaris, PMU Sweden, Pentecostal World Fellowship, Center for Earth Ethics, LM Läkarmissionen, SMC Global, and others, came together in January 2022 to map a way forward and feature in this upcoming historic international meeting.

Faith for Earth is facilitating a process of engagement of faith actors in Stockholm +50 by organising side events, issuing statements, highlighting faith perspectives and conducting workshops.

MINDFULNESS FOR PROTECTING THE PLANET FROM CLIMATE-RELATED CRISES

mindfulness meditation and prayer session led by different religious leaders. Ms Frances Hume, the National Development Officer, <u>Interfaith Scotland</u> will join us in organising this special event.



SIGNED MOU WITH SRMD

Shrimad Rajchandra Mission Dharampur (SRMD), a charitable and religious trust registered in India. UNEP Faith for Earth Initiative has signed a Memorandum of Understanding to create an environmental programme for children and teenagers focused on enhancing a culture of compassion to help engage and empower the next leaders towards generation of environment sustainability.

In India, the Faith for Earth Empathy Leadership (FEEL) Programme expects to motivate youth leaders and promote avenues for climate action using interactive learning material.

FAITH-BASED TREE PLANTING & FAITHPLANS

Faith-based tree planting has enormous potential to meet global ecosystem restoration and conservation needs. Faith groups globally plant millions of trees, yet to date there has been no concerted effort to understand the scale of faith tree growing efforts and its potential to meet global conservation goals, particularly amongst the faith community.

Faith for Earth and the World Wide Fund for Nature UK Beliefs and Values Programme (WWF-UK BVP), seek to collaborate on the issue of faith and environmental sustainability.





In 2022, this partnership aims to support the goals of the Faith Strategy on the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration through faith-based tree planing in Kenya and the Faith for Earth National Coordination Hubs in India, Ethiopia, Bosnia and Herzegovina, and Lebanon, map projects on nature-based solutions, and implement the Faith Plans Programme.


FAITH ACTION ON THE UN SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS PLATFORM
