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Why civil society engagement?

- **Rule 70 of Rules of Procedure**
- **UN practice as also outlined in “The Future We Want” and Governing Council Decision 27/2**
- **Stakeholder expertise enriches the inter-governmental decision-making process without questioning the intergovernmental nature of the UN Environment Programme**
- **Adds transparency and legitimacy**
- **Gives an opportunity for those who might be affected by decisions to raise their concerns**

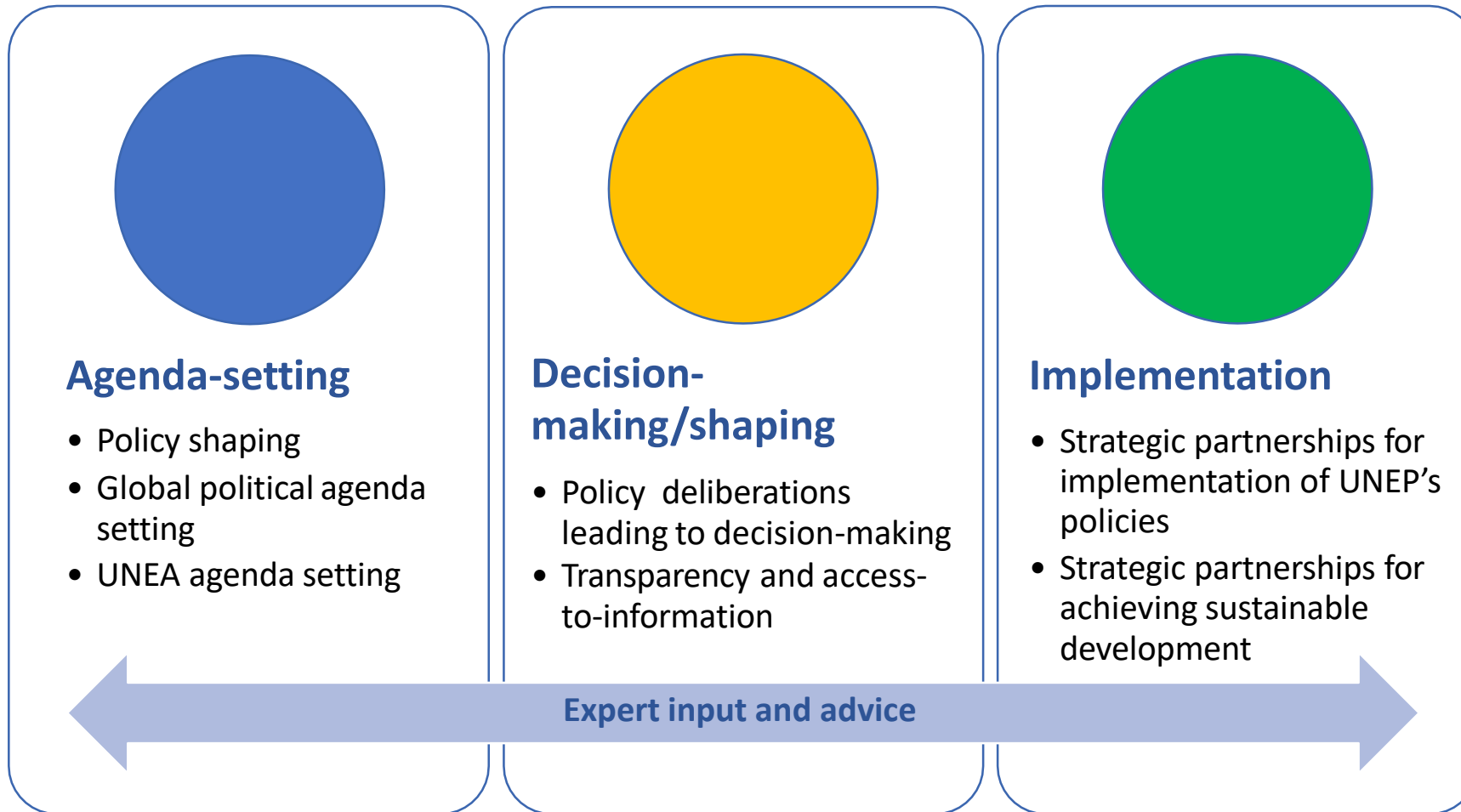
- **Women**
- **Children and Youth**

- **Local Authorities**
- **Workers and Trade Unions**

HOW?

- **Nine Major Groups and Stakeholders**
- Formal **accreditation** as a condition for participation
- In UNEA and CPR as **observer** with opportunity to provide oral and written statements
- Access to CPR portal including to un-edited working documents and **submission of written inputs**
- **Global Major Groups and Stakeholders Forum (GMGSF)** prior to the UN Environment Assembly as well as **Youth Environmental Assembly (YEA)**
- **Regional Consultative Meetings (RCMs)** – often back-to-back to regional Ministerial Forum
- **Major Groups Facilitating Committee and Regional Facilitators (MGFC)**

Three levels of engagement



Civil Society at meetings of the Committee of Permanent Representatives

- Accredited organisations may participate in all *public* meetings, including sub-committees
- Reserved seats for the nine Major Groups
- Online participation
- Opportunity for written and oral comments
- Accredited organisations receive relevant documentation and have access to portals

Civil Society Unit in the Governance Affairs Office

- Administers **Accreditation** of non-governmental observers to UNEA
- Civil Society engagement Website
- Organisation of **meetings, consultations, capacity building, outreach**
- **Stakeholder Engagement Handbook** as a guiding tool
- Assists **Major Groups Facilitation Committee (MGFC)**
- **Facilitates Global Major Groups and Stakeholders (GMGSF) and Regional Consultative Meetings (RCMs)** and the Multi-Stakeholder Dialogue during UNEA
- Supports **MGS engagement across the organisation**, such as for the INC or the Science-policy panel on Chemicals, Waste and Pollution Prevention at the moment.
- **Perspectives** publication series

Recent, Upcoming Events and Activities with MGS

- **The African Ministerial Conference on the Environment (AMCEN)**- 12 to 16 September 2022 in Dakar, Senegal (preceded by a regional CSO forum)
- **Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee (INC) 1** – 28 November- 2 December in Punta del Este, Maldonado, Uruguay with a preceding Multi-Stakeholder Forum on 26 November
- **Annual CPR Sub Committee Meeting** 24-28 October
- Soliciting MGS inputs to the **UNEA 6** theme
- **Ad-hoc open-ended working group (OEWG) on a Science-Policy Panel** to contribute further to the sound management of chemicals and waste and to prevent pollution
- **GEO-7 process incl of MGS engagement**

Accreditation

Accreditation criteria:

- Registered with a Government for at least 2 years
- Non-governmental, non-profit
- Focus on environment
- With environmental work locally and internationally

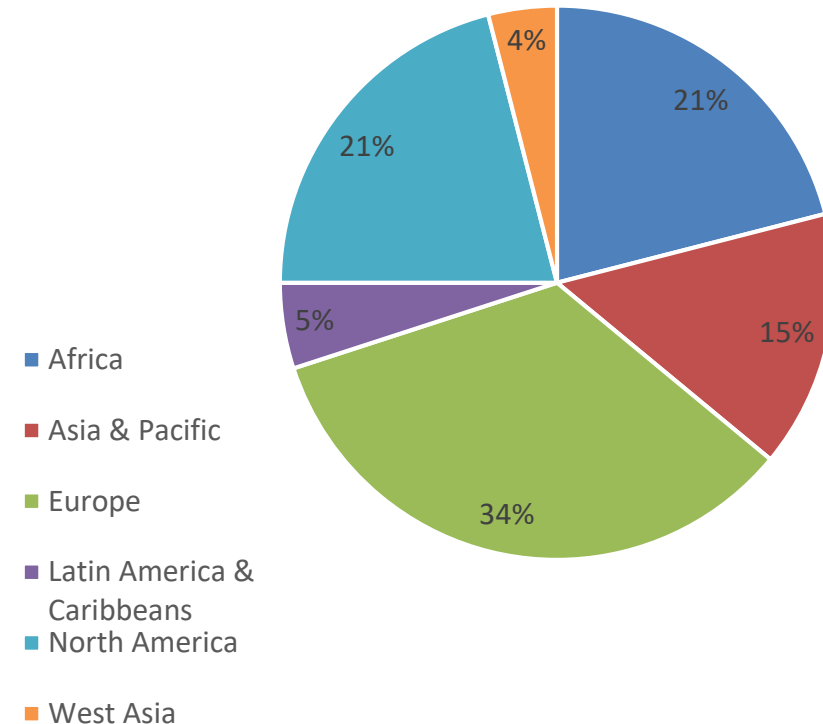
Number of accredited organizations:

- West Asia: 4%

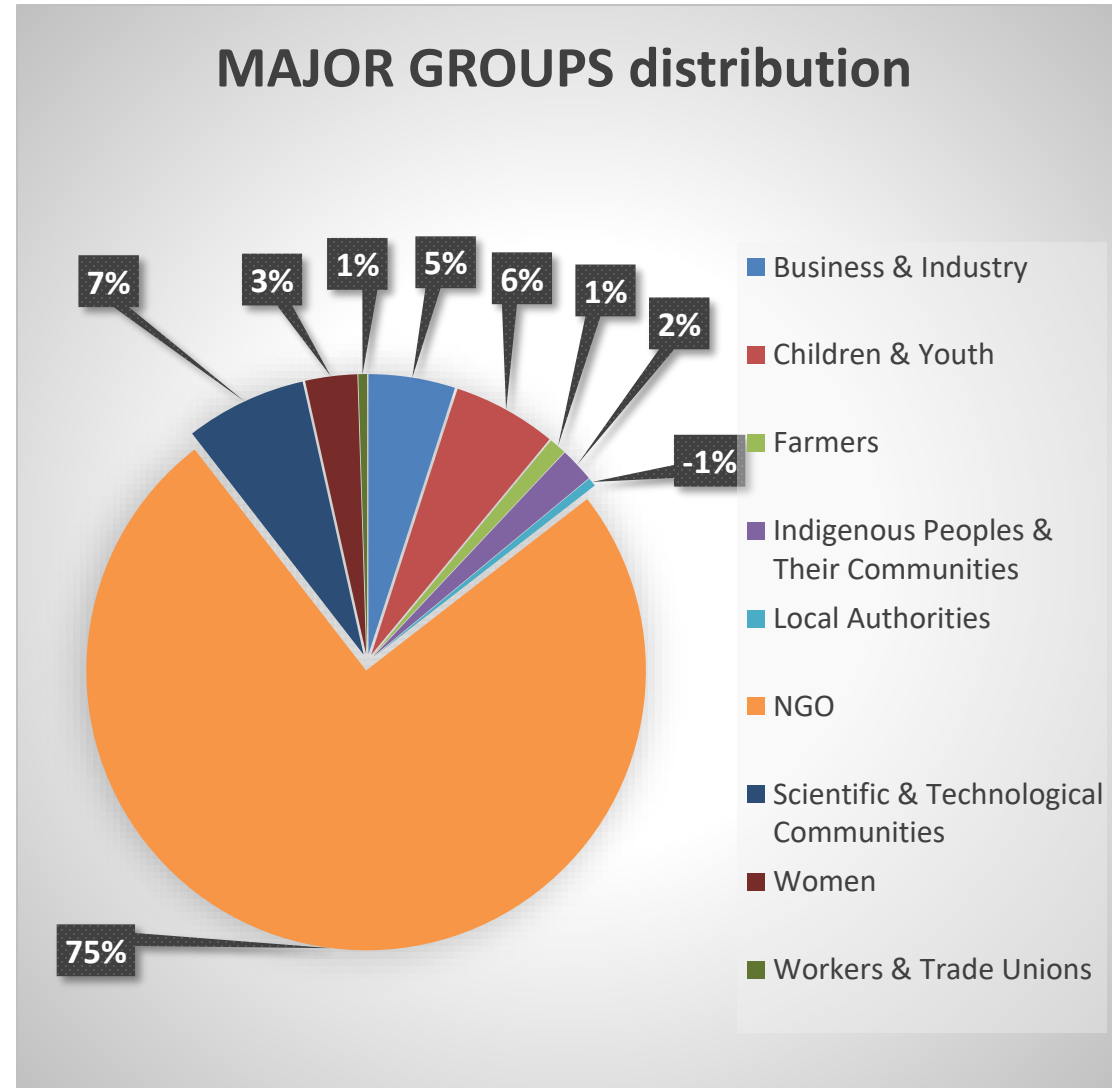
REGIONAL DISTRIBUTION AS ON 2 SEPT
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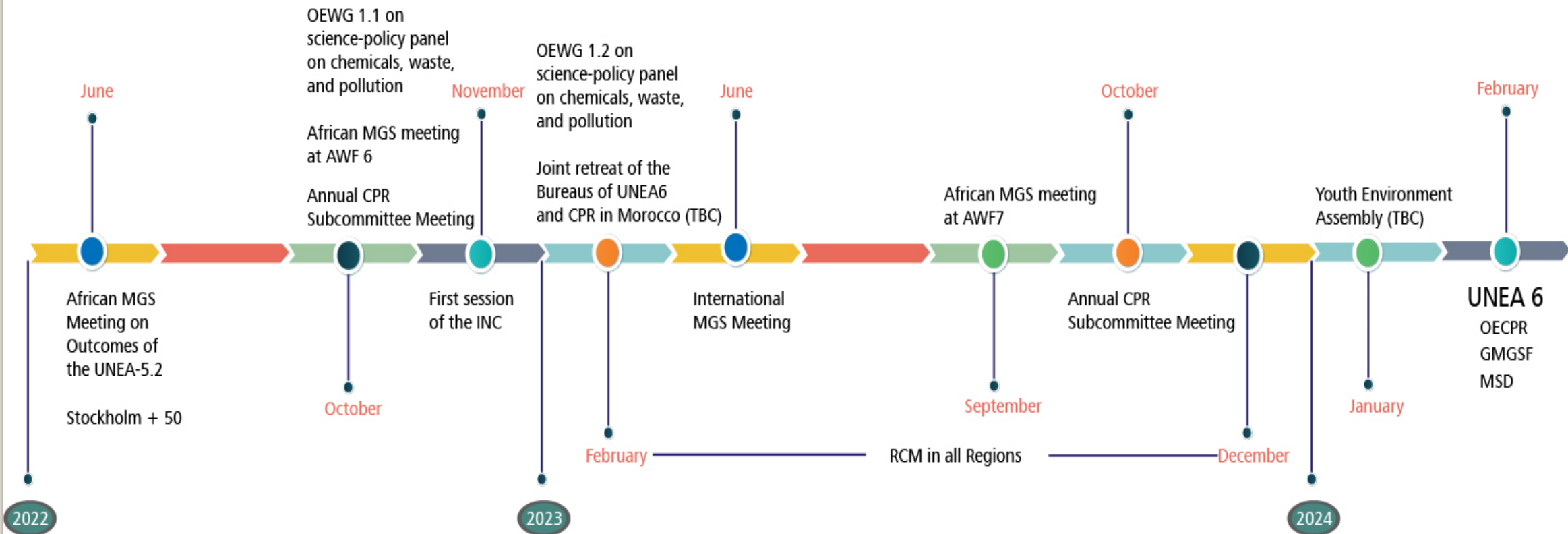


Accreditation continued

Distribution by Major Groups as of 2 Sep 2022:

- Business and Industry: 5%
- Children and Youth: 6%
- Farmers: 1%
- Indigenous Peoples: 2%
- Local Authorities: 0.5%
- NGO: 75%
- Scientific and Technological communities: 7%
- Women: 3%
- Workers and Trade Unions: 0.5%

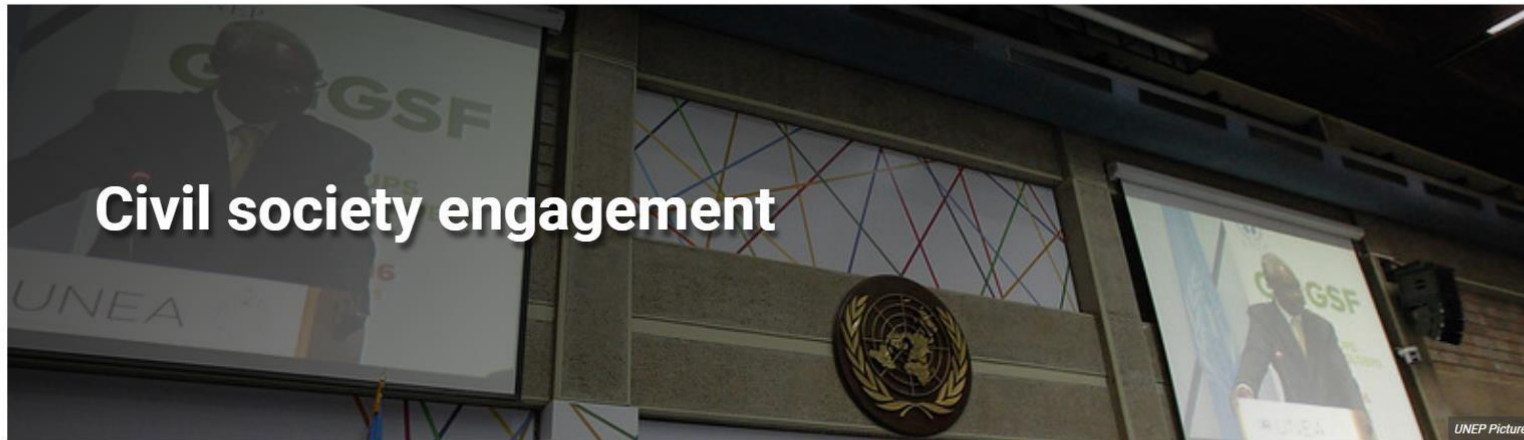
