Support of DION to the Global Mercury Partnership

The Development Indian Ocean Network (DION) is an NGO Network of the Small Island Developing States (SIDS). It initially started as a network of NGOs of the Indian Ocean Region of Africa comprising the islands of Comoros, Mauritius, Réunion and Seychelles, including the island of Madagascar.

DION is working on the issue of Mercury as a global pollutant. None of the Small Island States produces mercury. All our mercury is imported, either as metallic mercury or through products. While all countries of the globe were working on their National Action Plans (NAPS) on Mercury, DION has been instrumental in assisting the governments of the small islands in carrying out their activity by integrating the National Steering Committee in most of these small countries.

Through its diverse membership, DION has done independent survey on "mercury in products" that are all imported. In some countries DION worked together with the government on this survey. One of the favourite mercury issue for DION is "mercury in the dentistry sector." Today we witness almost all the small islands coming up with law on mercury phase down, phase out and a ban on amalgam use in dentistry for small children, pregnant and breastfeeding women.

The experience acquired after working on mercury for a decade now, DION has developed expertise on working both with the local communities, the grassroots including women, girls and youth in particular, and with the national governments.

All our awareness activities are focussed on protecting human health first and the environment. There are not much anthropogenic mercury releases in the SIDS but the greatest mercury exposure of the workers is noted in the dentistry sector. The public hospitals and private dental clinics using amalgam which is 50% mercury is a great health risk to all workers – doctors, nurses and maids in particular. In addition, the mercury wastes from these "clinics" enter the air, land and water since most of the small islands do not use separators.

This long experience places DION as an expert in mercury and can expertly assist the Global Mercury Partnership in its goal.
