


What is CITES (Convention on International Trade in Endangered Species of Wild Fauna and Flora)


- International agreement signed on 3 March, 1973
- Legally-binding instrument with 184 Parties: 183 countries + EU
- Objective: ensure that wild fauna and flora in international trade are not exploited unsustainably
- Combines wildlife and trade themes with common procedural mechanisms
- Three appendixes (I, II and III) regularly amended:
 - strictest control of international commercial trade in species threatened with extinction
 - effective regulation of international trade in others
