# Why civil society engagement?

- Rule 70 of Rules of Procedure
- UN practice as also outlined in "The Future We Want" and Governing Council Decision 27/2
- Civil Society and stakeholder expertise enriches the inter-governmental decision-making process without questioning the intergovernmental nature of UNEP
- Adds transparency and legitimacy to the work of UNEP
- Gives an opportunity for those who might be affected by decisions to raise their concerns but also make suggestions.




### HOW?

- Nine Major Groups and Stakeholders
- Formal accreditation as a condition for participation
- In UNEA and CPR as observer with opportunity to provide oral and written statements
- Access to CPR portal including to un-edited working documents and submission of written inputs
- Global Major Groups and Stakeholders Forum (GMGSF) prior to the UN Environment Assembly as well as Youth Environmental Assembly (YEA)
- Regional Consultative Meetings (RCMs) often back-to-back to regional Ministerial Forum with inputs submitted to UNEA as INF document
- Major Groups Facilitating Committee and Regional Facilitators (MGFC) as liaison to the wider constituencies including coordinating inputs to substantive consultations.




## Three levels of engagement




#### **Agenda-setting**


- Policy shaping

- Transparency and accessto-information

- Strategic partnerships for achieving sustainable development

Major Groups and Stakeholders global consultation on the way to GMGSF (Nov 2023)

6 online/ hybrid or in person RCMs covering all UNEP regions ( the official INF document reflects those positions and statements)

Global Major Groups and Stakeholder Forum (GMGSF): 2 day meeting prior to UNEA incl. exchange with ED (24-25 Feb 2024 in UNEP, Nairobi)

# Civil Society at meetings of the Committee of Permanent Representatives

- Accredited organisations may participate in all public meetings, including sub-committees
- Reserved seats for the nine Major Groups
- Online participation
- Opportunity for written and oral comments
- Accredited organisations receive relevant documentation and have access to portals



# Civil Society Unit in the Governance Affairs Office

- Administers Accreditation of non-governmental observers to UNEA
- Civil Society engagement Website
- Organisation of meetings, consultations, capacity building, outreach
- Stakeholder Engagement Handbook as a guiding tool
- Assists Major Groups Facilitation Committee (MGFC)
- Facilitates Global Major Groups and Stakeholders (GMGSF) and Regional Consultative Meetings (RCMs) and the Multi-Stakeholder dialogue during UNEA
- Supports MGS engagement across the organisation, such as for the INC or the Science-policy panel on Chemicals, Waste and Pollution Prevention or other consultative processes across substantive matters.

### Accreditation

#### **Accreditation criteria:**

- Registered with a Government for at least 2 years
- Non-governmental, non-profit
- Focus on environment
- With environmental work locally and internationally

#### Number of accredited organizations:

- 1035 as of 5 September 2023. List can be found here

#### Regional distribution as on 5 September 2023:

- Africa: 22%
- Asia and the Pacific: 17%
- Eastern European States: 3%
- Latin America and the Caribbeans: 5%
- Western European and Other States: 53%

### Distribution by Major Groups as of 5 September 2023:

- Business and Industry: 7%

- Children and Youth: 5%

- Farmers: 1%

- Indigenous Peoples: 2%

Local Authorities: 1%


- NGO: 73%

GMGSF: Global Major Groups and Stakeholders Forum


MSD: Multi Stakeholders Dialogue
