The environment-human rights nexus

The importance of the environment-human rights nexus dates back decades. It's recognized in the 1972 Stockholm Declaration and numerous constitutions and legal systems around the world recognize the right to a healthy environment.

Human rights and the protection of the environment are intrinsically linked.

- 🌿 Human rights cannot be enjoyed without a clean, healthy and sustainable environment;
- 🌿 Effective environmental protection depends on the promotion, protection and respect for human rights.

There's an emerging wave of judicial decisions highlighting the interconnection between human rights and the environment.



Rights-based environmental action

leaf icon The Human Rights Council has stressed and the IPCC has affirmed, that it is critical to [apply a human rights-based approach](#) to guide global policies and measures designed to address environmental crises.


leaf icon The essential attributes of a human rights-based approach are the following:

- As policies and programmes are formulated, the main objective should be to fulfil human rights.
- The *rights-holders* and their entitlements must be identified as well as the corresponding *duty-bearers* and their obligations in order to find ways to strengthen the capacities of rights-holders to make their claims and of duty-bearers to meet their obligations.
- Principles and standards derived from international human rights law – especially the [Universal Declaration of Human Rights](#) and the [core universal human rights treaties](#), should guide all policies and programming in all phases of the process.

leaf icon Supporting rights-based environmental action and advancing the right to a healthy environment will be strategic priorities for OHCHR under its new four-year Office Management Plan.

5. Commit to work with partners, including OHCHR and UNDP.

- leaf UNEP and OHCHR to continue joint programming and activities, collaborating with relevant stakeholders
- leaf Identify and further work on strategic priorities, such as protection of EHRDs, just transition and business and human rights
- leaf Deepen collaboration with UNEP's and OHCHR's field presences, working with Resident Coordinators and Country Teams
- leaf Advance the right to a healthy environment, including promoting its implementation and integration into UN processes and environmental decision-making
