UNEP Evaluation Office - overview



- <u>Independent Office</u> The independence of the Evaluation Office derives from the fact that the Head of Evaluation reports directly to the Executive Director (i.e. there is no common line management between the Evaluation Office and the work that it evaluates, as UNEP projects and programmes report through Divisions to the DED)
- Produces <u>high-quality evaluation reports</u> that are **not** subject to any management approval before their release
- All UNEP evaluation reports are <u>publicly disclosed</u> available on <u>WeDocs</u>.
- All evaluation reports <u>require a formal management response</u>
- All evaluation recommendations are subject to a <u>compliance assessment process</u>
- The Evaluation Office <u>regularly reports to the CPR</u>

UNEP Evaluation Policy



- <u>Evaluation Policy</u>: first approved in 2009, revised in 2016 fully updated in 2022
- Mandate: all projects, programmes, policies and initiatives under the scope of the Programme of Work / Medium Term Strategy. Conforms to all rules an regulations set out in formal UN documents e.g. ST/SGB/2018/3 and ST/AI/2021/3. In UNEP, only the Evaluation Office has the mandate to carry out evaluations.
- Ascribes to the UN Evaluation Group (UNEG) Norms and Standards for evaluation:
 The UNEG has set out important evaluation principles norms and standards including:
 - Utility

Transparency

Credibility

Professionalism

Independence

Human Rights and GE



Types of Evaluation (and Review)




- Subprogramme Evaluations All UNEP Subprogrammes must be evaluated within a period of 6 years:
- Thematic / Issue-based / Cross-cutting evaluations recent examples include the Evaluation of the implementation of UNEP's Gender Policy and Strategy and a Review of UNEP's contributions to Poverty Reduction
- Terminal Evaluations (TEs) are a summative assessment of performance, when a project reaches completion, that is carried out as a process <u>managed by the UNEP Evaluation Office</u>, normally by contracting external consultants;
- Management-Led Terminal Reviews (MLTRs/TRs) are a summative assessment of performance, when a project reaches completion, that is carried out as a process managed by the UNEP Project/Task Manager, normally by contracting an external consultant. The Review Report is quality assessed and validated by the Evaluation Office;
- Meta-Evaluations these are evaluations based on aggregated information, for example the Biennial Evaluation Synthesis Report 2022-2023 summarized UNEP project performance using information from completed project-level evaluations
