# Key points about GEO-7 3<sup>rd</sup> authors meeting



#### Successful second authors meeting (Vienna), followed by First Order Draft (FOD) peer review.

Authors addressed all comments from FOD review and prepared revised drafts for the Nairobi meeting. Executives Summaries for each chapter were also prepared to help a core drafting team prepare the FOD of the Summary for Policymakers.



3<sup>rd</sup> Authors meeting, cohosted by Hashemite Kingdom of Jordan, was shortened to 4 days, due to budget constraints.

Cross-chapter collaboration was the focus of the meeting, to ensure GEO-7 tells 'one story' across the 21 chapters. Small core group also spent 2 days drafting the Summary for Policymakers.



Efforts were made to harmonize the planetary crises narrative and include Indigenous Knowledge, Behavioural Science and Climate Adaptation.

Authors worked to create coherence across the environmental and human systems narratives. Illustrations and graphics were also worked on.



Parallel meetings of IMAG/MESAG also happened along with side events on transforming food systems and the work with the Government of Malawi on the NSEOR. IMAG and MESAG provided guidance to the Secretariat

# Encourage more intergovernmental and expert peer reviewers


- The First Order Draft review in February/March attracted 434 nominations. The Secretariat selected 244 to respect geographic and gender balance. 30 Members of MESAG and 38 UNEP representatives also were asked to review, for a total of 312.
- Of the 312, only 208 reviewers submitted comments. Overall, the peer review received only 3,710 comments on the 21 chapters.
  IPCC typically receives more than 16,000 comments on its FODs. This could affect the scientific integrity of the GEO-7 process.

- IMAG and MESAG have evaluated the situation and recommended that the GEO-7 intergovernmental and expert peer review process should focus on the balance of expertise when selecting peer reviewers.
- The selection of peer reviewers should also strive to achieve geographic and gender balance.
- The Secretariat is striving to attract more peer reviewers through outreach activities. UNEP's Communications Division has prepared a <u>web story</u> to attract more reviewers.
