UNEP Welcomes New National Ozone Officers of Kiribati, Papua New Guinea and Tuvalu

Bangkok, 30 June 2015 – UNEP – OzonAction in the Regional Office for Asia and the Pacific (ROAP) has welcomed new National Ozone Officers who will help three Pacific Island nations fulfil their obligations under the Montreal Protocol on Substances that Deplete the Ozone Layer.

The new National Ozone Officers from Kiribati, Papua New Guinea and Tuvalu have joined their National Ozone Units (NOUs) and taken on their new challenges in the first half of 2015.

Kiribati



Ms. Taomarie Baraam is the new National Ozone Officer in the Republic of Kiribati and joined the Environment & Conservation Division (ECD) of the Ministry of Environment, Lands and Agricultural Development. Ms. Baraam was part of the team implementing the HCFC Phase-out Management Plan (HPMP) and has also worked as a national Assistant-Chemical Officer with the Strategic Approach to International Chemicals Management (SAICM) project. Papua New Guinea



Ms. Anita Poesi joined the Conservation & Environment Protection Authority as the National Ozone Officer for Papua New Guinea (PNG) in January 2015. Her first responsibility is dealing with matters related to the country's HPMP and promoting public awareness of the importance of phasing out ODS, especially in dealing with the industry sector.

"We need to engage better control on the type of refrigerants and equipment being imported and ensure relevant good/safe practices are being adhered to. The awareness will also involve promoting the introduction of natural alternatives. I believe an effective awareness

campaign and appropriate plus timely legislative applications will assist in ensuring a more economical and easy conversion for PNG in 2025" Ms. Poesi said.
