	Engage in food banks		Organize Food Waste Feasts
8	Educate community through trainings and workshops		Remove trays in cafeterias or in your mass feeding events. Removing trays reduces food waste up to 32%.
	Replace meals in cafeterias and canteens with low-impact ones.	404	Encourage gardening in your churches, mosques, shrines and temples backyard.



Natural ventilation in buildings can save energy up to 25-50%.



Use daylighting as a type of lighting, it can decrease energy costs up to 75%



Install Energy and water saving devices and use solar energy systems.



Plant trees and grow organic produce in the gardens and open spaces.



Prefer a permeable surface for your parking lots and outdoor walkways.



Mobilize community action through campaigns and contests that encourage the sustainable use of resources.



Organize events and workshops to connect interested stakeholders to support sustainable construction practices for your worship house.



Provide shuttle buses or trams powered by green energy.



Provide pilgrims with a map indicating public transportation options and highlighting green hotels and restaurants in the site.



Encourage community to cycle between different destinations in the holy site and provide bicycle parking racks.



Incentivize pilgrims to not litter and engage them in cleaning up the existing waste.



Partner with local NGOs to fight against litter and waste problems.



Partner with restaurants on green energy use and avoidance of food waste in holy sites.



Compensate for your footprint by planting trees or donating to local communities for greening efforts.



Prepare guidelines for your community on how to have green celebrations.



Try to substitute the essential materials used in your celebrations with sustainable alternatives



Instead of burning incense sticks, promote locally grown flowers. It will reduce air pollution.



Encourage recycled materials for gift wrapping for religious celebrations



Conduct monthly/weekly challenges like No-Plastic Use or No-Meat Consumption



Organize a green "Show and Tell" event in your worship house where people can share their sustainable lifestyles examples and experiences.
