Voluntary indicative scale of contributions

Note by the Executive Director

Summary

The present note provides information on the application of the voluntary indicative scale of contributions and how the scale has been adapted, as referred to in paragraph 19 of United Nations Environment Assembly resolution 2/20, in the light of the universal membership of the governing body of the United Nations Environment Programme. The annexes to the present note are presented without formal editing.

I. History of the voluntary indicative scale of contributions

1. In its decision SS.VII/1, the Governing Council of the United Nations Environment Programme adopted the report of the Open-ended Intergovernmental Group of Ministers or Their Representatives on International Environmental Governance at its seventh special session, held in Cartagena, Colombia, in 2002.

2. In paragraphs 16 and 17 of its report, the Open-ended Working Group stated that all Member States of the United Nations and members of its specialized agencies should contribute financially to the Environment Programme. Towards that end, it called for the establishment of a voluntary indicative scale of contributions to broaden the base of contributions and to enhance predictability in the voluntary financing of the Environment Fund. The voluntary scale was to be developed taking into account, among other things, the United Nations scale of assessment and the following factors:

- (a) A minimum indicative rate of 0.001 per cent;
- (b) A maximum indicative rate of 22 per cent;
- (c) A maximum indicative rate for the least developed countries of 0.01 per cent;

(d) The economic and social circumstances of the Member States, in particular those of developing countries and countries with economies in transition;

(e) Provisions to allow for any Member State in a position to do so to increase its level of contributions over and above its current level.

3. The Open-ended Working Group confirmed that all Member States, taking into account their economic and social circumstances, would be encouraged to contribute to the Environment Fund either on the basis of the indicative scale of contributions or on the basis of any of the following:

- (a) Biennial pledges;
- (b) United Nations scale of assessments;
- (c) Historical level of contributions;
- (d) Any other basis identified by the Member State;

4. At the same time, the Open-ended Working Group confirmed that all contributions to the Fund would remain voluntary and each State reserved the right to determine whether or not it wished to contribute voluntarily to the Fund.

5. In response to the Council's adoption of the Working Group's report, the Executive Director of the Environment Programme launched a pilot phase of the voluntary indicative scale of contributions for one year, 2003. During the same year, the guiding principles and criteria for the voluntary indicative scale of contributions were further elaborated and presented to the Governing Council at its twenty-second session, requesting that:

(a) All the countries that were paying contributions equal to or above the United Nations scale maintain their high levels of contributions and countries in a position to do so consider making higher payments over and above their existing level of contribution;

(b) All the developed countries, countries with economies in transition and many developing countries that were contributing below the United Nations scale increase their contributions gradually and pay closer to the United Nations scale and their previous historical high level of contributions.

6. In 2008, in his report on trends in contributions to operational activities for development of the United Nations system and measures to promote an adequate, predictable and expanding base of United Nations development assistance (A/63/201), the Secretary-General acknowledged that the initial result of introducing the voluntary indicative scale of contributions was very promising.

7. Following the pilot phase of 2003, the voluntary indicative scale of contributions has been applied and revised in the bienniums 2004–2005, 2006–2007, 2008–2009, 2010–2011 and 2012–2013 at the request of the Governing Council. The governing body continued to reiterate the need for stable, adequate and predictable financial resources for the Environment Programme throughout.

II. Commitments made by Member States to provide secure, stable, adequate and increased financial resources to the United Nations Environment Programme

8. In its resolution 67/213, the General Assembly decided to strengthen and upgrade the United Nations Environment Programme in the manner set out in subparagraphs (a) to (h) of paragraph 88 of the outcome document of the United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development, held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in June 2012. As part of that decision, Member States were requested to provide secure, stable, adequate and increased financial resources to the Environment Programme both from the regular budget and from voluntary contributions.

9. In its resolution 71/243, on the quadrennial comprehensive policy review of operational activities for development of the United Nations system, the General Assembly called for adequate quantity and quality of voluntary funding for operational activities and the need to make voluntary funding more predictable, effective and efficient. It further noted that core resources, because of their untied nature, continue to be the bedrock of operational activities for development of the United Nations system, and in that regard expressed concern at the continuing and accelerated decline in the amount of core contributions in recent years. In the light of that, the General Assembly urged countries to maintain and substantially increase their voluntary contributions to the core budgets of the United Nations funds, programmes and specialized agencies (the Environment Fund in the case of the Environment Programme) and contribute on a multi-year basis in a sustained and predictable manner.

10. At its twenty-seventh session and its first universal session, held in February 2013, the Governing Council, in paragraph 19 of its decision 27/2, stressed the need by no later than 2016 to implement the provisions of paragraph 88 (b) of the outcome document regarding secure, stable, adequate and increased financial resources. The implementation of that decision is still ongoing.

11. The member States have continued to reiterate the need for stable, adequate and predictable financial resources and urged donors to increase voluntary funding to the Environment Programme including to the Environment Fund. Those calls were made by the Governing Council at its twenty-seventh session in paragraphs 23 and 24 of its decision 27/13 and by the United Nations Environment Assembly in its resolutions 1/15 and 2/20 (paragraphs 18 and 19 in both cases).

III. Application of the voluntary indicative scale of contributions since the United Nations Conference on Sustainable Development

12. Following the provisions of the resolutions of the General Assembly, the Governing Council in paragraph 26 of its decision 27/13 noted the positive effect of the voluntary indicative scale of contributions to broaden the base of contributions to, and to enhance predictability in the voluntary financing of the Environment Fund, and requested the Executive Director to adapt the voluntary indicative scale of contributions in the light of the universal membership of the Environment Programme, in accordance with decisions SS.VII/1 and any subsequent decisions.

13. The voluntary indicative scale of contributions for 2014–2015 was adjusted accordingly with particular emphasis on the following:

(a) Member States were requested to contribute at least on the same percentage basis as their United Nations assessed scale level for 2013–2015, which is considered to reflect their current status of economic and social development;

(b) Member States already contributing at or above the United Nations assessed scale were requested to retain their higher levels of contributions;

(c) Member States that were contributing below their highest ever payment were encouraged to strive to return to that level of funding.

14. Applying the principles articulated above required many member States to contribute to the Environment Fund many times more than in previous years. In anticipation of difficulties in achieving the requested increases rapidly, the Executive Director encouraged the member States to make a commitment to gradually increase their contributions towards the level of the voluntary scale from the outset. It was also expected that the increase in the Environment Fund contributions would mainly be through a shift from earmarked contributions, considering the difficult financial situation globally.

15. In paragraph 22 of its resolution 1/15, the Environment Assembly reiterated the call made by the Governing Council in paragraph 26 of decision 27/13 and requested the Executive Director to continue adapting the voluntary indicative scale of contributions in the light of universal membership.

Subsequently, the voluntary indicative scale of contributions for 2016–2017 was prepared following the same emphasis as for the 2014–2015 scale and with reference to the United Nations assessed scale for 2016–2018. It was applied to the approved budget of the Environment Fund of \$271 million in 2016–2017.

16. The Executive Director notified each member State of their suggested level of contribution according to the voluntary indicative scale of contributions in early 2016. Following the responses received the scale was finalized in April 2016. However, the actual amount of contribution provided by each Member State remained at their discretion. The 2016–2017 indicative scale and the actual contributions received against it in 2016 and up to 13 November 2017 are attached as annex I to the present note (2017 actual contribution figures to be completed in early 2018).

III. Proposed 2018–2019 voluntary indicative scale of contributions

17. In paragraph 19 of its resolution 2/20, the Environment Assembly noted the positive effect of the voluntary indicative scale of contributions and requested the Executive Director to continue adapting the voluntary indicative scale of contributions, inter alia, in accordance with any relevant subsequent decisions. The Environment Fund, which is the primary source of non-earmarked funding for the Environment Programme, is to receive contributions worth \$271 million in 2018–2019.

18. In support of applying the decisions of the governing bodies to the development of the proposed scale for 2018–2019, the Secretariat assessed the recent contribution trends to the Environment Fund (table 1). It was noted that the unanticipated sharp strengthening of the United States dollar against many other currencies during the second half of 2014 negatively affected the value of the 2015 contributions made in local currencies. The exchange losses reduced the number of member States that were able to contribute at or above their proposed scale of contributions. In 2016 the trend improved despite the continued strong value of the United States dollar. A decision was therefore made to apply the same emphasis to the 2018–2019 proposed scale as was used for the 2014–2015 and 2016–2017 scales (see paragraph 13 above).

19. The Executive Director is notifying each member State of their suggested level of contribution according to the proposed voluntary indicative scale of contributions for 2018–2019 between November and December 2017. Although the actual amount of contribution to be provided by each member State remains at their discretion, the Executive Director encourages each member State to make every effort to contribute at least in line with the proposed scale (annex II).

20. The Environment Fund provides the core resources to the United Nations Environment Programme for fulfilling its mandate and delivering on its programme of work that allow the Environment Programme to set the global environmental agenda, convene decision makers and be the leading advocate for the environment. The Environment Fund also enables the Environment Programme to promote a strong science-policy interface to support policymaking, build capacity and facilitate access to technology. Furthermore, those unrestricted funds enable the organization to detect emerging issues and find innovative solutions as well as share evidence-based information and raise public awareness.

21. The Environment Programme's fundraising efforts have been guided by the funding strategy of 2014, which emphasized the need for a shift towards an increase in non-earmarked funding, a widened base for contributors and more partnerships that catalyse resources at all levels. In line with paragraph 20 of United Nations Environment Assembly resolution 2/20, the Environment Programme has developed a new resource mobilization strategy that is expected to be discussed with the Committee of Permanent Representatives in early 2018.
