Entitled "For People and Planet: The United Nations Environment Programme Strategy for 2022–2025 to Tackle Climate Change, Loss of Nature and Pollution", <u>UNEP's Mid-Term Strategy for 2022-2025</u> was discussed and adopted by 193 countries that participated in the Fifth United Nations Environment Assembly virtually held 22-23 February.

Congratulations to UNEP, the international community, and in particular to the faith community and our accredited faith-based organizations who participated and contributed to making sure that the role of religious players is included in the Strategy and highlighted as an innovative communicating strategy driving environmental advocacy. The Mid-Term Strategy has further stressed that UNEP will continue to promote faith-based organizations and communities as custodians of far-reaching, value-based perspectives on environmental sustainability that speak to billions of people around the world. UNEP will operate on the basis of an inclusive multilateralism that reaches beyond governments and supports systemic shifts, with the help and collaboration of the private sector and business community, youth, civil society at large and faith-based organizations.

In his address during the Leadership dialogue that was organized during the 5th United Nations Environment Assembly on 22 February 2021, His Excellency Mr. Guomundur Ingi Guobrandsson, Iceland Minister for Environment and Natural Resources called the international community and the decision makers meeting during UNEA to adopt a resolution to support the Faith for Earth Initiative of UNEP. A Strategy for Engagement: The Role of Faith Leaders and Faith-Based Organisations in the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration (2021-2030)



On 12 February 2021, Dr. Iyad Abumoghli, Director of Faith for Earth joined members of the Steering Committee of UNEP MGCY Shantanu Mandal from Brahma Kumaris; Alphonce Munyao Muia from Catholic Youth Network for Environmental Sustainability Africa (CYNESA); and Neeshad Shafi, Arab Youth Climate Movement, in a Youth and Faith-Based Engagement Thematic Consultation.

The session drew over 160 participants and delved into the faith perspective and how it resonates with environmental governance within the intergovernmental processes, and the need to eliminate inter-generational gaps in collaboration amongst faith groups in tackling environmental challenges. Vatican Faith and Science: Towards COP 26

In recognition of the role of faith leaders in tackling climate change and to lead preparations for COP26 to be held in Glasgow in November 2021, the British and Italian Embassies to the Holy See, together with the Holy See, and facilitated by Wilton Park, have started a series of <u>virtual preparatory meetings</u> to enable faith leaders to share their faith's theology on care for the environment; outline the action they have taken so far in tackling climate change; and discuss the way forward to COP26. Faith for Earth has been invited to take part as a UN advisor to these discussions.

This series of dialogues, culminating in an event to be held in Rome prior to COP26, will provide a platform for faith leaders to articulate our common duty to address climate change, encouraging national governments to raise their ambition regarding their NDCs, to reach the Paris Agreement goals; to show how the faiths are leading the way by greening their own operations at central and local level, and making new commitments; and to encourage the faithful to take action to slow global temperature rises.



Mapping Faith Actors' preparations for COP 26



National Faith for Earth Coordination in India

Faith for Earth announced, in its <u>January Newsletter</u>, the launch of three National Coordination Hubs in India, Lebanon, and Bosnia and Herzegovina.

As part of the National Coordination Hub in India, The United Religions Initiative, in partnership with Religion World and Shristi, sought to circulate a mapping survey to a group of 70+ FBOs in and around Delhi. Seven world religions as well as interfaith organizations and Indigenous groups participated: there were 63 responses! The results of the survey will be shared in April but preliminary results indicate that in order to actively engage local, grassroot faith-based organisations in addressing the environmental challenges in India, training, capacity building, and science-based education resources are essential. URI are therefore, guided by the results of the survey in focusing on Water & Sanitation, Life on Land, and Climate Action during the Capacity Building and Development Program in March. The Living Chapel Reduce, Reuse and Recycle

Nearly 700kg of recycled aluminium was used to create the structure of the Living Chapel, which was repurposed by the Penn College team who worked tirelessly to create what is the Living Chapel today. Parts from automotive metal stamping plants were used in their original form to create the walls alongside recycled PVC to incorporate the plants.
