THE DIVERSE VALUE OF NATURE; UN DECADE CONSULTATION SERIES

Dear friends.

The Intergovernmental Science-Policy Platform on Biodiversity and Ecosystem Services (IPBES) launched the Assessment Report on the Diverse Values and Valuation of Nature, highlighting the need for a revaluation of nature.

The assessment sought to understand and articulate the role of values in driving protection for biodiversity. The Report finds that there are a number of deeply held values that can be aligned with sustainability, emphasizing principles like unity, responsibility, stewardship and justice, both towards other people and towards nature.

The Assessment places a spotlight on values as a means to shift decision-making, recognising the values of nature and in driving system-wide transformative change. Watch the Media Launch.


In this regard, young people of faith around the world are called upon to share their experiences, challenges and opportunities in tackling the triple planetary crises.

20TH AMECEA PLENARY OF BISHOPS

Between 9-18 July, the <u>Association of Member Episcopal Conferences in Eastern Africa</u> (AMECEA) held the 20th Plenary of Bishops in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania.

This year the theme was **Environmental Impact on Integral Human Development** to build consensus and strategic action plans to address the impact of environmental degradation and climate change.

UNEP Faith for Earth delivered a keynote address highlighting the need to engage institutions in Africa at all levels, particularly in support of projects like the Great Green Wall Initiative.

RELIGIOUS COMMUNITIES AND SUSTAINABILITY: ECOLOGICAL PERSPECTIVES ON RELIGIOUS PRACTICE

On 25 June 2022, the seminar workshop hosted by the Humboldt-Universität zu Berlin took place virtually on the relationship between religious communities and socio-ecological transformation, considering that in recent years engagement with ecological sustainability by religious communities has substantially increased.



In this event, UNEP Faith for Earth's Director, Dr. Iyad Abumoghli explained how spiritual values can contribute to sustainable policy-making with his presentation "The Role of Religions, Values, Ethics, and Spiritual Responsibility in Environmental Governance and Achieving the Sustainable Development Agenda".
