Meeting of the Bureau of the Contracting Parties to the Convention for the Protection of the Marine Environment and the Coastal Region of the Mediterranean and its Protocols

Rome, Italy, 3-4 November 2011

Progress Report by the Secretariat on activities carried out during the period January 2010-September 2011

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Introduction

1. This report covers the activities and outputs carried out in the period between 1 January 2010 and 30 September 2011.

2. The progress report is composed of a narrative part that highlights results, mid-term results and progress achieved during this period under the 6 themes and detailed information on legal, policy, financial and administrative matters. Annex I provides in detail information on the progress achieved and where appropriate, on issues at stake per output, with regard to future planning and implementation.

- 3. Key progress and achievements:
 - Conclusion of steps 3 and 4 of the ecosystem approach roadmap approved by the Contracting Parties in Almeria, 2008, agreed at the Government Designated Expert meeting (GDE), and on the list of 11 Ecological Objectives (EOs) and the 52 of indicators integrating pollution, biodiversity and coastal management issues through a process involving all MAP components and led by experts from the Contracting Parties;
 - Completion of the ecosystem based Mediterranean assessment report which was peer-reviewed by GESAMP. Building upon this work, preparation is also underway for the State of the Environment report (SoER) for the biennium, to be launched at the 17th meeting of the Contracting Parties. In this process, close synergy is being established with plans for implementation of the EU Marine Strategic Directive in the Mediterranean;
 - The 14th Mediterranean Commission on Sustainable Development (MCSD) meeting held, with a focus on Green Economy, institutional arrangements, a proposal for a contribution to Rio+20, improvements to the draft climate change framework and recommendations for the strengthening the MCSD;
 - Completion of the draft 2012 to 2013 programme of work (PoW), fully in line with the 5 year strategy, taking into account progress achieved, and emerging issues through a consultative process outlined in the Governance paper and discussed at the Focal Points meetings of the RACs currently being updated inline with the guidance received from the 72nd Enlarged Bureau Meeting held in Athens on 3 to 5 October 2011;
 - Component Focal Points meetings held, which provided important guidance for completion of the PoW, and policy recommendations for consideration at the 17th

meeting of the Contracting Parties, including on decisions to be submitted to the Contracting Parties;

- Assessment on the implementation of the MSSD for the period 2005 2010 completed¹ and recommendations reviewed and approved at the at the 14th MCSD meeting. The process for the preparation of the 2015 2025 MSSD will begin in the next biennium, and will address the recommendations made in the assessment;
- Implementation of the MSSD reported. Progress of the 34 priority MSSD indicators analysed in the MSSD assessment and 2011 update report on MSSD indicators finalized²;
- Host Country Agreements. The Secretariat has developed a common template for the hosting of Regional Activity Centres (RACs) by the concerned countries outlining the mandate, responsibilities and Governance for each Centre. The draft was improved after discussions with the Contracting Parties and shared with the parties concerned at the Bureau Meeting of the Contracting Parties held in Rabat on May 2010 and at the Extended Bureau of the Contracting Parties to the Barcelona Convention, held in Athens from 3 to 5 October 2011 which welcomed the progress made by the Contracting Parties in putting in place Host Country Agreements for the RACs and encouraged them to finalize these agreements as soon as possible;
- Preparation and adoption of regional plans: including the endorsement of plans on BOD in the food sector, Mercury, and POPs in May 2011, and the finalisation of a policy paper and a strategic framework for marine litter, which will be the basis for the Marine Litter Action Plan to be adopted by the Contracting Parties. The Mediterranean Strategy on Ships' Ballast Water Management³, including its action Plan and Timetable were adopted by Focal Points in May 2011and will be presented to the Contracting Parties;
- Work started on the preparation of a risk assessment a management framework for CO2 storage in sub-seabed geological formations in the Mediterranean basin. The work is being carried out in the framework of MED POL with the kind contribution of the Government of Spain;
- Following the decision of the 71st Bureau, the Action Plan for the implementation of the ICZM Protocol was prepared between the Coordinating Unit and PAP/RAC and is expected to be finalized in October 2011. In addition a draft Reporting Format for the ICZM Protocol has also been prepared under the guidance of the Coordination Unit;
- An analysis and interpretation of the ICZM Protocol, Article 8 on the setback zone has been performed. Being one the most critical Articles, it has been elaborated for the purpose of the analysis of the impact of the ICZM Protocol on the spatial planning documents of Montenegro;
- An analysis of the Croatian legal system with regard to the ICZM Protocol was also under development, planned to serve as a good example for other countries to follow, in particular those eligible for the MedPartnership project, in order to comply with the Protocol. Gaps in the legal system are to be identified and solutions proposed;
- Strengthening of financial management and taking corrective measures to address over budgeting and financial deficit underway. Draft budget being prepared based on the new budget format and cost reduction scenarios as decided by the Extended Bureau held in Athens on 6 October 2011;

- New project proposals and concepts drafted and submitted for Global Environment Facility (GEF), European Commission and other funding sources for achieving the outputs of the Five-Year Strategic Programme of Work with regard to ecosystem approach, adaptation to climate change, strengthening SPAMI network, etc.; In order to better coordinate resource mobilization in the future, resource mobilization strategy is being prepared for submission at the next Focal Points Meeting;
- The MedPartnership Project is ending its second year of implementation, with two Coordination Group and Steering Committee meetings successfully coordinated, with a revised website⁴, and the publication of its 2010 Annual Report;
- UNEP/MAP Communications Strategy and Action Plan finalised for the period of 2012 to 2014 for presentation at the 17th meeting of the Contracting Parties, which was based on the assessment and recommendations prepared in 2010 and endorsed at the Bureau meeting (UNEP/BUR/70/5) in Rabat, Morocco in May 2010;
- Development and implementation online since September, 2010 of the Mediterranean Information System on the Environment and Sustainable Development (SIMEDD)⁵, which offers access to the users to a 120,000 data index on the main issues and themes of the Sustainable development in the Mediterranean;
- Improved communication on activities: new RAC/SPA's website and publishing a Flash news; new graphic guidelines for the CHM on marine and coastal biodiversity as well as the improvement of the MedGIS interface;
- Advanced regional knowledge on biodiversity, including assisting the countries to set up monitoring networks for key habitats; preparation of guidelines; inventorying of non indigenous marine species on 31 sites on the coasts of Albania and Montenegro; and the organization of two sub-regional/regional symposia for applying action plans concerning the species;
- "State of Play in the Mediterranean" report for the specific needs of southern Mediterranean countries with a focus on Horizon 2020 priorities, prepared for the implementation of the 'Towards a Shared Environmental Information System (SEIS)"⁶.
- 4. Lessons learned and difficulties encountered:
 - In accordance with the Marrakech Declaration a draft regional adaptation to climate change framework was developed and reviewed at the 14th MCSD meeting. Several of the priority actions identified will be implemented from 2012 with additional funds, under the auspices of the *"Integration of climatic variability and change into national strategies to implement the ICZM Protocol in the Mediterranean"* project. The Coordinating Unit proposes further develop the framework for finalization during the next biennium;
 - The policy for the assessment of marine and coastal environment will be conducted in the next biennium, in the framework of the ecosystem approach. The Ecosystem Approach assessment and agreement on EOs and indicators will contribute greatly to this process, and coupled with the MSSD assessment it is envisaged that a truly integrated approach for the implementation and reporting of the Ecosystem Approach and MSSD will be established in the next biennium.

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5. The coming period should contribute to reinforce the work done and the results already achieved, finalize the planning and programming for the next biennium with a particular focus on delivering a substantive 17th Contracting Parties meeting.

6. In addition the Secretariat would like to provide the Bureau with some detailed information on legal and policy issues for which guidance and advice from Bureau members is needed:

1.1 Legal issues

1.1.1 <u>Status of ratification and entry into force</u>

7. Since the last Bureau meeting Morocco has ratified the new Prevention and Emergency Protocol and both the Offshore and ICZM Protocols entered into force thanks to the ratification of the Government of Syria. According to the latest updates on the status of ratification recently received by Spain in its capacity as Depositary state for the Barcelona Convention and its Protocols, following a request by the Secretariat, the situation is as follows:

6 Contracting Parties have ratified ICZM Protocol, 2008.

8. Detailed information on the status of ratification and entry into force is presented in Annex II to this report.

9. The entry into force of MAP legal instruments is progressing. However, additional efforts should be made with a view to having all MAP legal instruments in force for all Contracting Parties. In this context, the encouragement by the Bureau of those Contracting Parties that have not yet ratified MAP legal instruments to do so as soon as possible is necessary and in particular the Dumping Protocol which is pending only one acceptance of the 1995 amendments.

1.1.2 <u>Reporting on implementation</u>

10. According to decision IG 19/4 on reporting and effectiveness indicators, the Contracting Parties have the obligation to submit their report on measures taken to implement the Convention and its Protocols for the 2008-2009 biennium as soon as possible so as to leave necessary time to the Secretariat to assess the information provided, and prepare the regional assessment report for the consideration of the Compliance Committee and Contracting Parties' meetings. In this respect, the Secretariat has sent a letter in July 2011 to all MAP Focal Points as a reminder for submission of national reports before 15 September 2011.

11. Following the discussions and decisions of the last Bureau meeting, and followed up by letters by the Secretariat the reporting format is again made on line since November 2010 allowing the Contracting Parties to upload their reports in English and or French by end of 2010.

12. 15 reports have been submitted by the Contracting Parties on measures taken by them on implementing the Barcelona Convention for the period of 2008-2009, in compliance with the reporting obligations under article 26 of the Barcelona Convention.

Draft recommendation

The Bureau is invited to welcome the ratification and entry into force of the ICZM and the Offshore Protocols, taking into account that these advanced legal instruments are pioneering and unique on the Mediterranean and global levels and provide an excellent platform for improved environmental governance in the region. It also calls on Contrating Parties to ratify all legal instruments with a particular focus on adopting the amendments to the Dumping Protocol.

The Bureau is also invited to call upon the Contracting Parties to submit without delay their report on measures taken during 2008-2009 biennium for the implementing the Convention and its Protocols as a principal obligation under the Barcelona Convention, and

The Bureau looks forward to the Secretariat's assessment report on the status of implementation of the Convention and its Protocols for consideration by the Compliance Committee and the Meeting of the Contracting Parties in 2011 as provided for in the Mechanisms and Procedures on Compliance under the Barcelona Convention and its Protocols.

1.1.3 Compliance Committee

13. The Compliance Committee has held its 4th meeting in Athens on 5 and 6 July 2011 chaired by Mr Larbi SBAI the new President elected by the Compliance Committee. With regard to the submission of reports, the Compliance Committee has made an assessment of the reporting obligation imposed by article 26 of the Barcelona convention. In that regard, it has recalled that repeated failure to comply with this obligation was a potential situation of non-compliance and has requested the Contracting Parties on the urgent need to submit their national report for 2008-2009 biennium without delay. As of 14th October 15 Contracting Parties have submitted their reports to the Secretariat. The Fifth meeting of the Compliance Committee is planned to take place on 10-11 November 2011 in Athens.

1.1.4 Liability and compensation

14. In accordance with the Decision IG.19/3 of the 16th Meeting of the Contracting Parties, the Working Group of Legal and technical experts of Legal and technical experts has been mandated to make an assessment of the implementation of the Guidelines for the determination of liability and compensation for damage resulting from pollution of the marine environment in the Mediterranean Sea. In that respect the Working group has scheduled its Fourth meeting on 8 and 9 December 2011 in Athens in order to analyze the replies made by the contracting Parties in the report for the application of these Guidelines in particular to the Offshore Protocol. In this respect, a study will be presented on the evaluation of the implementation of the liability and compensation regime, stipulated in Article 27 of the Offshore Protocol, in the framework of the relevant liability and compensation regimes in force. A report of the activities of the Working group will be submitted as an information document to the WG on Off-shore issues, to be established under Decision on implementing the Off-Shore Protocol at the 17th Meeting of the Conference of the Contracting Parties. In addition, the programme of work foresees one additional meeting during the next biennium

2012-2013 in order to allow the Working group to pursue the implementation of its Programme of action.

1.2 Cooperation and partnerships

15. During the period under review the UNEP/MAP has launched initiatives to strengthen partnerships with Global Environmental Conventions as well as other relevant UN programmes and departments establishing synergies and strengthening the coherence and impact of our policies and actions on issues of common interest.

16. The Marine Strategy Framework Directive (MSFD) of the European Union and the Ecosystem Approach. In 2008 the Contracting Parties to the Barcelona Convention recognized the need to better protect the ecosystems at both regional and sub-regional levels by progressively applying the ecosystems approach to the management of human activities that may affect the Mediterranean marine and coastal environment and adopted a roadmap for its implementation (Decision IG 17/6). The Ecosystems Approach adopted by the parties to the Barcelona Convention is consistent with the Marine Strategy Framework Directive (MSFD, 2008/56/EC) thus ensuring a harmonized implementation of obligations under the two legal frameworks for the 7 Contracting Parties of the Barcelona Convention that are also EU member states. A project funded by EC and UNEP/MAP ongoing since 2009 is supporting the implementation of the first steps of the roadmap. The first assessment of the Mediterranean Ecosystem which has been peer reviewed by GESAMP and by countries has been completed; an integrated set of 11 ecological objectives, operational objectives and indicators has been developed which is fully owned by all parties to the Convention. This priority implementation framework is based on and is consistent with the EU MSFD Descriptors while adapted to the Mediterranean circumstances thus going beyond the MSFD as it also covers coastal ecosystems; an on-going pilot is testing the feasibility and availability of the innovative indicators proposed; countries neighboring high seas in three locations of particular ecological interest (SPAMI) have started dialogue on ways to jointly address main pressures; and, a common methodology for determination of good environmental status and targets is expected to be adopted before the end of the year. These achievements will be presented to the 17th Meeting of Contracting Parties to the Barcelona Convention next January 2012.

17. Horizon 2020 Initiative. The Secretariat and in particular its components MED POL and CP/RAC have continued to be active in the three components of the initiative (pollution reduction, monitoring and capacity building). The Initiative has taken into full account the progress made by MED POL in the implementation of the SAP and the NAPs. In particular, in the pollution reduction component of the initiative, projects identified by the EC and its partners were mostly based on the priority identified by the countries in their MED POL National Diagnostic Analyses and the investments listed in their National Action Plans. The European Investment Bank (EIB) has already selected a number of bankable projects, which are now under consideration for funding. The Horizon 2020 and the NAPs will jointly contribute to the common objective to substantially reduce land-based pollution. Concerning the capacity building component of Horizon 2020. MED POL has contributed to the preparation of the programme of work and has provided expert trainers in the field of industrial pollution, environmental inspectors and desalination. In the context of the Horizon 2020 Initiative, cooperation was also strengthened with the European Environment Agency (EEA) in the field of monitoring and assessment and the identification of appropriate indicators. Several meetings were held to discuss the related work of MED POL and the Agency on indicators and data availability to try to find a common approach and strategy for the future work of monitoring and assessment that the Horizon 2020 Initiative will require. In July 2011 it was agreed to prepare a Joint Work Programme between EEA and UNEP/MAP to be completed by October 2011.

18. In this context the European Environment Agency (EEA) contracted MAP to make an assessment of the data available in the Mediterranean together with the existing information systems and the data collection processes, the "State of Play and specific needs of ENP south countries with regard to main Shared Environmental Information System (SEIS) components focusing on horizon 2020 priorities". The analysis was much welcomed by partners and carried out by MAP as a team, led by the Coordinating Unit and with active involvement of MED POL, Blue Plan and INFO/RAC.

19. Following coordination between the Coordinating Unit of UNEP/MAP and the Division of Environment Laws and Conventions (DELC) of UNEP regarding MAP's participation in mechanisms to strengthen relations between Environmental Global Conventions, UNEP/MAP has been the first Regional instrument invited by the Steering Committee of the United Nations Information Portal on Multilateral Environmental Agreement (InforMEA)⁸ to integrate the Barcelona Convention with InforMEA. InforMEA was launched in June 2011 and brings together 13 MEA Secretariats representing 17 global Agreements and the Barcelona Convention as a first regional instrument. InforMEA provides a search facility across MEA COP decisions, news, events, national focal points, and - soon to come - national reports and implementation plans. The material can be retrieved through a combination of free text search and a search according a set of 200 hierarchical terms jointly identified by MEAs. The information is harvested directly from participating MEA secretariats who remain the custodians of the data. This collaboration amongst MEA and UNEP also collaborates on improving on-line reporting systems.

20. Regular Process under DOALOS. The Secretariat is undertaking steps to coordinate the Mediterranean Assessment processes under the Ecosystems Approach with the UN Regular Process for Global Reporting. It is discussing with UNEP/DEWA, the possibility to organize in 2012 a capacity building workshop in the context of the Regular Process with a view to brief parties to the Barcelona Convention on the Regular Process and analyze the Mediterranean Assessment and complimentary information required, as need be, in light of the next Global Assessment which is foreseen by 2014.

21. Convention on Biological Diversity (CBD). The Coordinating Unit has strengthened its contacts with the CBD Secretariat with a view to cooperate in the implementation of the marine and coastal chapters of the Aichi Plan of Action in the Mediterranean region. A representative of the CBD Secretariat visited UNEP/MAP Offices in May and proposals were made to develop a Memorandum of Understanding between both Organizations.

22. General Fisheries Commission (FAO/GFC). The Secretariat is also strengthening its cooperation with the General Fisheries Commission particularly in the context of the application of the Ecosystems Approach in the Mediterranean. Representatives of the GFCM were invited for purposes of presenting the integrated assessment organized by INFO/RAC as well as technical meetings and Government Designated Experts (GDE) meetings in the context of the Ecosystems Approach. The contribution of the GFC has been effective in the finalization of EO relevant to their mandate (EOs 3.1 and 3.2) and selection of indicators. The traditional good cooperation on protected areas and species continued, particularly with SPA/RAC, and has been expanded and will be further strengthened in the context of establishing protected areas in Areas Beyond National Jurisdiction (ABNJ).

23. Union for the Mediterranean (UfM). In follow up to the meeting with the previous Secretary General, a meeting with the Deputy Secretary General on Environment issues Dr. Rafik Husseini and UNEP/MAP Senior Management was recently held to prepare the visit of the Coordinator to the UfM in November 2011 with a view to develop a Memorandum of Understanding for cooperation.

24. The MedPartnership project, can be seen as a good example of successful partnership, jointed executed by UNEP MAP and its components (MEDPOL, CP/RAC, PAP/RAC and SPA/RAC), UNESCO-IHP, FAO/GFCM, UNIDO, and non-governmental organizations WWF-MedPO, GWP-MED, MIO-ECSDE. One good example of this partnership are UNESCO-IHP, GWP-Med and PAP/RAC that are collaborating for the first time together to develop a joint integrated methodology for coastal zone and water (including groundwater and aquifer) management, which is being applied in two areas, the Buna/Bojana (Albania/Montenegro) and the Reghaia (Algeria) coastal zones. In particular the MedPartnership has been in partnership with the WB since 2009 under the umbrella of the Investment Fund projects and Sustainable Med programme, to promote together best practices and their replication.

25. The Marseille Center for Mediterranean Integration is responsible for the WB Sustainable Med Programme. It has approved that the BP/RAC will now become the lead executing agency for the "Sustainable Med Programme: Governance and Knowledge Generation" with GEF funding to begin implementation in early 2012. The project governance component aims inter-alia to promote the establishment of Environmental Management Systems review; partner with the EU Horizon 2020 initiative; support local constituencies and regional integration through joint activities on climate change and management of shared ecosystems; support MCSD; and establish a network of prosecutors. Its knowledge generation part aims, inter alia, to develop a "Med Report", studies on Economics of Wastewater reuse and desalination; efficient water pricing; and renew of EIA regulation.

26. Related to Sustainable Consumption and production, CP/RAC is preparing agreements with World Wild Fund to collaborate and exchange its experience and implement activities together on Pesticides, food, and POPs, and with the Cooperation Center for the Mediterranean region of Red Cross, on implementing activities on awareness rising on Sustainable Consumption Production for its network.

27. The implementation of the EU-funded MEDA Regional SAFEMED II Project by REMPEC continued at a steady pace during the period under review. In April 2010, following an addendum to the Project's contract, the EC decided to extend some of the project tasks to four UfM South East European States. Moreover, in July 2011, as it was anticipated that at the end of the Project there will be a balance of unspent project funds, it was agreed, through a further addendum to the contract, to extend the Project by another year till the end of 2012.

28. During the period under review, REMPEC continued its cooperation with IMO for the implementation of IMO's ITCP funded regional activities in the Mediterranean in the field of prevention of, preparedness for and response to marine pollution from ships. In relation to the proposed Mediterranean Strategy on Ship's Ballast Water Management it was necessary to liaise with other Regional Seas Agreements namely, OSPAR, HELCOM and Black Sea Commission in order to take into account the specific relevant requirements of different regional seas. A General Guidance document on the Voluntary Application of the D1 Ballast Water Exchange Standard by Vessels Operating between the Mediterranean Sea and the North-East Atlantic and/or Baltic Sea was referred to and adopted by the Contracting Parties to the Helsinki Convention during the 32nd Meeting of the HELCOM Commission in March 2011. Following adoption of the document by the next Contracting Parties Meeting to the Barcelona Convention, a joint submission with the other concerned Regional Seas Agreements will be made to the Secretary-General of IMO

29. RAC/SPA, during this reporting period, has been creating and strengthening partnerships with regional organizations such as the ACCOBAMS Secretariat, GFCM Secretariat, IUCN Mediterranean Centre for Cooperation, the Secretariat of the RAMOGE agreement, the Mediterranean programme of the WWF and the Secretariat of the Marine Protected Areas managers Network in the Mediterranean (MedPAN) strengthening the

leverage of some activities. Several partnerships were also developed with national structures (Republic of Slovenia's Nature Conservation Institute, French Conservatoire du Littoral (CdL), Tunisian Agency for the Protection and Management of Coasts (APAL), French Agency for Marine Protected Areas (AAMP), National Office for the Conservation of Wild Fauna (ONCFS; France), Egyptian Agency for Environmental Affairs (EAEA), Libyan Environment General Authority, Hellenic Centre for Marine Research (HCMR), Institute of Marine Biology of Kotor (IBMK, Montenegro) and national NGOs (Association for the Protection of Aquatic Wildlife of Albania (APAWA), The friends of birds Association (AAO, Tunisia). Those partnerships contribute to a good appropriation of the activities carried out in the countries. Lastly, RAC/SPA continue to collaborate with several national research institutes (National Institute of Marine Science and Technology (INSTM, Tunisia), ECOMERS Laboratory of the University of Nice-Sophia Antipolis (France).

1.3 Financial, Personnel and Administrative Matters

Financial Matters

Remittance of Contributions

30. The status of the Mediterranean Trust Fund as at 30 September 2011 stood as follows:

- Total pledges of ordinary contributions for 2011: EUR 5,540,569.
- Total collections during 2011 for 2011: EUR 3,447,564 (62.2% of 2011 pledges).
- Total unpaid pledges for 2010 and previous years: EUR 476,385 (almost the whole amount relates to one country only).
- Total unpaid contributions to date are EUR 2,569,390. This amount comprises unpaid pledges for 2011 (EUR 2,093,005) and outstanding pledges from 2010 and previous years (EUR 476,385).

31. During 2011, voluntary contributions have been received from the EU (EUR 237,724 in total), from European Environment Agency/EEA (EUR 14,000), from the Government of Spain (EUR 100,000), and from the Host Country of Greece (EUR 282,287). An additional voluntary contribution is expected from EU (EUR 598,569).

32. Details of payments and outstanding contributions are at **Annex III.** UNEP HQ and the Coordinating Unit have made an extensive follow-up with regards to pledges in arrears. These extensive efforts have resulted to an excellent rate of collection for prior years' pledges (46.3%⁹). The amount that still remains uncollected is practically related to one country only.

33. Progress has also been achieved with the Government of Greece regarding outstanding issues linked to the Host Country contribution, with a view to make a proposal clarifying the matter at the Bureau and COP meetings.

Programme Budget of MAP

34. Internal revisions have been carried out throughout all MAP Components (Coordinating Unit, MEDPOL and the RACs) in order to reduce the level of expenditures of the MTF budget 2010-2011 correcting the over-budgeting and thus avoiding increasing further the MTF deficit. In this context, MTF expenditures for 2010-2011 have been reduced by 14% on

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average. Additionally, a number of measures has been implemented to increase the efficiency in MAP's financial management as well as to enhance the delivery of the Programme of Work. These measures have already been presented in the extended Bureau meeting held between 3 and 5 October 2011 (UNEP/BUR/72/3).

- **Coordinator** (Post No: MEL-2322-2B91-2664-1101-00): Ms Maria Luisa Silva Mejias (Spanish national) was selected for the position and took up her new duties as of 1 February 2011.
- **Deputy Coordinator** (Post No: MEL-2322-2B91-2664-1102-00): Mr Habib El Habr (Lebanese national) has been laterally moved from the post of UNEP/R0WA Director in Bahrain to the post of MAP Deputy Coordinator by Mr. Achim Steiner, UNEP Executive Director. He reported for duty in Athens on 15 July 2011.
- **Programme Officer for the Coordinating Unit** (Post No: MEL-2322-2B91-2664-1103-00): The post was made vacant upon Ms. Tatjana Hema's re-assignment to MEDPOL in the context of the voluntary rotation programme launched by UNEP in 2010. The post was open to all interested applicants and advertised in the United Nations on-line new recruitment system, INSPIRA for 60 days from 4 March 2011. Copies of the Job Opening were sent to MAP Focal Points and a link to the vacancy was also available on UNEP/MAP web page. 115 applicants were considered eligible for the position. Interviews were held in July 2011 and the recruitment process is underway. In the meantime, Ms Virginie Hart, Mediterranean Marine and Coastal Expert for the UNEP/MAP/GEF MedPartnership project, was assigned to temporarily support in these functions from 18 April to 30 September 2011.
- Information Officer (Post No: MEL-2322-2B91-2664-1105-00): Ms Luisa Colasimone (Italian national) separated from service on 16 May 2011 due to a health condition. The post has been advertised in INSPIRA on 16 September 2011 for 60 days.
- Med Pol Programme Officer (Post No: MEL-2322-2B93-2664-1103-00): in the context of the voluntary rotation programme, Mr Fouad Abousamra (Syrian national) was moved to UNEP/ROWA in Bahrain and Ms Tatjana Hema (Albanian national) was re-assigned to the post of MEDPOL Programme Officer officially as of 15 February 2011. However, in view of ensuring continuation of tasks and a smooth transition, Ms Hema was requested to perform duties of the Coordinating Unit until 30 June 2011.
- Legal Officer (Post No: ME/6030-04-04-120): The post has temporarily made frozen due to financial constraints. In the meantime, a Legal Expert, Mr. Didier Guiffault (French national), has assumed the functions of Legal Officer. Based on a non-reimbursable loan agreement between the Government of France and UNEP, he will perform his functions at no cost to the Secretariat.
- Library Assistant (MEL-2322-2B91-2664-1317-00): Ms Margaret Watts (British national), who was on a one-year Special Leave Without Pay since 16 July 2010, submitted her resignation from the position upon termination of her leave for personal

reasons. Ms Aliki Pavlidou (Greek national) has temporarily replaced Ms Watts since 13 September 2010.

Functional Review: UNEP undertook a functional review of UNEP administered MAP components, i.e. the Coordinating Unit for the Mediterranean Action Plan and MED POL, with the goal to identify the functions, skill sets and structure needed to best implement work priorities outlined in the Governance paper approved by the Contracting Parties in 2008, the decision on the mandate of MAP Components and the five-year programme of work adopted by the Contracting Parties to the Barcelona Convention in 2009 as well as the 2008 audit recommendations. The Functional Review was conducted from 11 October until 15 December 2010 and was presented to the Extended Bureau Meeting on 3-5 October 2011 (UNEP/BUR/72/Inf.4) which considered it useful and requested it to be extended to the rest of the system.

Consultants (working at Coordinating Unit premises):

- **Mr. Harry Coccossis'** (Greek national) engagement during six months until June 2011 to implement activities related to the Mediterranean Commission on Sustainable Development (MCSD) and the Mediterranean Strategy for Sustainable Development (MSSD).
- **Mr. Dimitris Tsotsos** (Greek national): upon departure of Mr. Fouad Abousamra from MED POL in March 2011 and until Ms Tatjana's Hema assumed full responsibility of the post on 1 July 2011, Mr. Tsotsos was hired to assist the MEDPOL Coordinator from 1 April to 30 June 2011.
- **Ms Christine Haffner-Sifakis** (German national): Ms Haffner-Sifakis has been hired by the MedPartnership project Management Unit (PMU) for three months since 16 May 2011 to assist the Project Manager of the UNEP/MAP/GEF MedPartnership on Marine and Coastal issues and replace Ms Virginie Hart during her short-term assignment with the Coordinating Unit.

His assignment started on 6 September 2010 and ended on 5 June 2011.

Theme II. Integrated Coastal Zone Management

Main Output

Coastal zone management achieves effective balance between development and protection through:

- Assistance to countries in implementing the ICZM Protocol
- Assistance to countries in preparing National ICZM Strategies and ICZM Plans
- Preparing ICZM methodologies and tools
- Coordination of and assistance in implementation of CAMPs
- One voice campaign for UNEP MAP Coast Day celebration

35. During the period under review the Secretariat's work with regard to Integrated Coastal Zone Management has substantively progressed on the following:

- Stocktaking questionnaire for ICZM in the Mediterranean finalized and disseminated to the Contracting Parties. Inputs from countries underway and synthesis report to be drafted in September 2011. A similar questionnaire has been developed (as part of the PEGASO project¹⁰) for the Black Sea and is pending inputs from countries.
- An Explanatory Guide on the ICZM Protocol, that will provide a more technical explanation of the Protocol requirements, is under development, and will later be

widely disseminated as a good interpretation and explanation tool for each of the Articles of the Protocol.

- An integrative methodological framework, as a methodology for converging sectoral inputs (water resources, aquifers, climate change and biodiversity) into ICZM has been initiated, and a respective working group established. This is an innovative methodological document with long-term effects on ICZM planning and management. In addition, an outline of ICZM Plans and National ICZM Strategies has also been initiated though the MedPartnership project¹¹ along with methodologies on how to prepare those plans and strategies. Both guidelines are put in practice in two ICZM Plans (Buna/Bojana in Albania/Montenegro and Reghaia, Algeria), and the Algerian and Albanian National ICZM Strategies are in preparation.
- An Interactive Governance Platform as a tool for linking ICZM end users, scientists and practitioners for the purpose of implementing the ICZM Protocol has been in progress. This is an activity in the frame of PEGASO project¹², funded by the EU Framework Programme (FP7).
- There are a large number of CAMPs¹³ being simultaneously implemented. The CAMP Morocco was completed in June 2010. The CAMP in Spain is in full implementation, following the nomination of national teams. The CAMP Agreement for Montenegro was prepared and signed at the MCSD meeting in Budva in May 2011. In France, the Feasibility Study has been initiated and in Italy, the Feasibility Study is to be completed.
- The new MedOpen Basic training course¹⁴ was updated in October 2010, and the advanced training course was successfully launched in November 2010. Coastal Alerts, providing PAP/RAC web site visitors with the latest information on interesting papers, research and other sources of ICZM-related information, have been improved and are being regularly uploaded to the PAP/RAC web site¹⁵. The main PAP/RAC web site itself has been marked as the best one in the MAP system by the Weber Shandwick analysis in the context of a MAP Information and Communication Strategy 2010-2015. The site is being regularly updated.
- The Regional Coast Day celebrations successfully took place in Algeria on the 25 September 2011

- 37. Key progress and achievements:
 - Harmonized voluntary arrangements for ballast water management in the Mediterranean addressing the risk of alien species invasion via ships' ballast water were agreed to by the Mediterranean coastal States. These arrangements are of a voluntary and interim nature and will be applicable as from 1 January 2012, and until the date the Ballast Water Convention enters into force. A notification of these voluntary interim arrangements was sent to all IMO Member States in August 2011¹⁹;
 - Assessments finalized with regard to Mercury, BOD₅ from food sector and POPs as the basis for the legally binding measures included in the regional plans to be submitted to Contracting Parties for adoption;
 - Assessment of trends for the period of 2005 to 2010 of pollutants inputs finalized and available;
 - An assessment of bathing water quality together with guidelines for the preparation of beach profiles prepared and quality criteria and standards agreed for adoption by the Contracting Parties;
 - Capacity building programme implemented for the analysis of chemical contaminants (with 2 training courses for inorganic and organic contaminants), the preparation of Pollutant Release and Transfer Register (PRTR) project in Turkey underway, improvement of inspection systems through the preparation of indicators;
 - Two Adriatic countries are filling the gap concerning the level of preparedness and response to marine pollution, i.e. Montenegro and Albania by elaborating contingency plans to be adopted soon. This is paving the way towards a future extension of the existing sub-regional agreement between Italy, Slovenia and Croatia to the whole Adriatic Sea;
 - The 2011 Edition of the Guidelines for the use of dispersants for combating oil pollution at sea in the Mediterranean region have been approved by the 10th Meeting of REMPEC Focal Points. Available in English, the French version will be disseminated at a later stage²⁰;
 - The Mediterranean Oil Spill Waste Management Guidelines and Decision Support Tool²¹ were adopted by the 10th Meeting of REMPEC Focal Points;
 - Revision and updating exercise of the Mediterranean Integrated Decision Support Information System (MIDSIS-TROCS) version 2.0 initiated and completion of MIDSIS TROCS version 3.0 (online and desktop version) expected for September 2011; this decision-support tool developed by REMPEC is aimed at assisting REMPEC's Operational Focal Points in the decision making process when dealing with marine pollution emergencies caused by releases of Hazardous and Noxious Substances (HNS), as well as by certain crude and refined oils;New monitoring data uploaded by the Secretariat to the LBS Protocol (Bosnia & Herzegovina, Croatia, Cyprus, Egypt,
