- Faith and Pollution Action.



Inspiring Faith, Hope, and Transformative Action to Accelerate Progress Towards the SDGs was a high-Level event organized by the Trilateral Partnership of Regional Faith-Based Networks for the SDGs, scheduled during the September 2023 SDG Summit. Faith for Earth addressed the need for "Strengthening Resilience through Collaborative Climate Initiatives: UNEP and Faith-Based Organizations' Joint Efforts" noting the need for the network to synergize with each actor leveraging their respective strengths to advance the Movement.

Joining the 2023 <u>global campaign no #BeatPlasticPollution</u> meant increasing public awareness; encouraging transformative action on plastic pollution; and building and nurturing effective coalitions for future global environmental campaigns.

Faith for Earth shared 3 actions that faiths can take to #BeatPlasticPollution; drew support from faith leadership including Sister Jayanti, Sadhguru, Arch. Prof. Thomas Schirrmacher, Rev. Fr. Joseph Mutie, Prof. Azza Karam, and H.E. Card. Michael Czerny on behalf of the Holy Father Pope Francis; and makes available the Interfaith Working Group on Pollution.

Sustainable Lifestyles

Religion, values, and ethics shape lifestyles - from what believers eat, wear, and how they interact with one another. This includes an understanding of the relationship with the earth, and its the treatment.

Faith & Climate Action

2023 was a major year for the Movement, and the Coalition demonstrated its leadership in convening the Interfaith Working Group on Climate Change towards the UNFCCC COP28.

It was a three-part process consisting of:

Pre-COP Thematic Consultations

A series of <u>10 thematic consultations</u> with UNEP experts, FBO practitioners, and members of civil society for a whole-of-society approach. This process aimed to take stock of the network's engagement on climate-related priorities, facilitate peer-to-peer learning, and promote capacity-building efforts.

The Global Faith Leaders' Summit: Confluence of Conscience: Uniting Leaders for Planetary Resurgence

28 faith leaders and more than 200 participants representing youth, women, scientists, academia and politicians came together from 6-7 November 2023 at the 'Confluence of Conscience: Uniting for Planetary Resurgence' to sign the <u>'The Abu Dhabi Interfaith Statement for COP28'</u>.

These commitments reflected the importance of strategies to enhance the role of religious leaders and symbols in contributing toward achieving climate justice. <u>Read the 10 main points under the</u> <u>Statement</u>. <u>Pope Francis and Grand Imam of Al-Azhar signed the</u> <u>Interfaith Statement</u> in support of urgent climate action.

Faith Pavilion

The first ever <u>Faith Pavilion</u> at a World Climate Conference was hosted by the Muslim Council of Elders in collaboration with the COP28 Presidency, the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) Faith for Earth Coalition, and a diverse coalition under the Interfaith Working Group on Climate Change including the Interfaith Center for Sustainable Development, the Episcopal Diocese of California, the Peace Department, the International Partnership on Religion and Sustainable Development (PaRD), and over 50 faith organizations.















The Faith Pavilion recognised the importance of faith actors in shifting the needle on climate actions providing a unique opportunity for dialogue, capacity building, information sharing, and engagement with key stakeholders including civil society actors, negotiators, and political decision makers. The Moral Imperative towards Children

Offering insights since the launch of <u>Climate-Responsible Finance: A Moral Imperative towards</u> <u>Children</u> and <u>appeal</u> in 2022, and the <u>Faith & Science</u> appeal in 2021 that included the commitment "to move away from investments in fossil fuels and toward investments in renewable energy(..)", <u>World Council of Churches</u>, <u>UNEP</u>, <u>Joint Learning Initiative on Faith & Local Communities</u>, and the <u>Laudato Si Movement</u> invited leaders and decision-makers, Child rights specialists, Young people, Finance specialists, Faith-based actors, Secular partners to a session unlocking successful methods for climate-responsible finance.

The Director of the Law Division remarked "Since the launch of this appeal, we have seen incredible progress made towards the goal of climate-responsible finance. Faith leaders, investors, and financial institutions have come together to create new initiatives, programs, and policies that prioritize sustainable and responsible investment practices." However, there is still much work to be done.

Other climate action-related activities:

- 2023 Africa Regional Workshop for Environment, Climate, and Resilience hosted by the Swedish Mission Council (SMC), Lakarmissionen (LM) and Kenya4Resilience (K4R) to build capacity of grassroots member organisations, increase networking, programming, and advocacy related to Biodiversity, Climate Justics and Disaster Risk Reduction/Resilience. Faith for Earth shared further information about the Interfaith Working Group on Climate Change as the principle mechanism for engagement.
- Faith Action on the UN SDGs launched a Climate Action supplement focusing on SDG 13. It <u>features six projects</u> that prioritise interreligious collaboration.
- Faith and the Future: Empowering Sustainability through the Fossil Fuel Non-Proliferation Treaty by the Laudato Si' Movement. Dr. Iyad articulated the inclusion of spiritual values in the new development paradigm, weaving together wisdom from Jewish, Islamic, and Christian traditions. These spiritual values, including stewardship of the Earth, justice, equity, and caring for future generations, mirror the ethical and moral principles embedded in FFNPT.

Faith & Nature Action

Restoration and Conservation

Committed to the implementation of the <u>#GenerationRestoration</u>, and the strategy document: <u>Mainstreaming Faith-based Engagement under the UN Decade on Ecosystem Restoration</u>, the Coalition and WWFs Beliefs and Values Programme launched:

- <u>Tree Growing for Conservation and Ecosystem Restoration: A Guide for Faith-based Actors</u> with Trillion Trees
- <u>Case Studies of restoration efforts in Kenya and Tanzania</u>
- Faith groups help to save disappearing forests (Story)

An exploration of <u>Restor</u>, a geo-mapping platform, with the <u>Communion Forest</u> sought to understand the challenges that grassroots implementers face while carrying out their activities, including relating to monitoring best practice.

Critical resources under the UN Decade include: <u>10 Principles for Ecosystem Restoration</u>; <u>Community</u> <u>Organizing Toolkit on Ecosystem Restoration</u>; and other <u>publications</u>.

Biodiversity

The Coalition was pleased to support Faiths for Biodiversity in convening <u>Earth restored: joining hands</u> <u>with faith-based organizations to implement the KMGBF</u> organised at the twenty-fifth meeting of the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice (SBSTTA 25) on 15–19 October 2023.

At the event, a <u>primer</u> on Faith and Biodiversity highlighting how faith groups can work towards the implementation of the Kunming-Montreal Global Biodiversity Framework (KMGBF) was launched, and was <u>further discussed at the Faith Pavilion</u>. <u>Follow this conversation on X</u>.

Food Systems Transformation

Iyad Abumoghli (UNEP), Laura De Matteis (FAO), Lina Mahy (WHO), Oliver Oliveros (Agroecology Coalition), Tina Cambiaghi (International Land Coalition/IFAD), convened by the <u>Faith & Food Coalition</u> took stock of the progress made after the Food Systems Summit in 2021, ahead of the <u>UN Food</u> <u>Systems Summit +2 Stocktaking Moment</u>.

Policymakers and International leaders <u>shared their insights</u>, but the series placed an emphasis on the need for faith communities and grassroots actors to voice their support and engage for transformative and just food systems.

The UN Water Conference 2023

Representatives of faith-based organisations worked on <u>Water & Health</u> as a thematic priority. WCC EWN's leadership in supporting the <u>Water Justice Manifesto</u> enabled the network to engage further with civil society, especially Indigenous Peoples.

In March 2023, the Faith For Earth Coalition co-hosted with WCC EWN, PaRD, and WEA SC an <u>Interfaith</u> <u>networking event ahead of the UN Water Conference 2023</u> recognising that multiple partners were present. Commitments to the Water Action Agenda were made by at least six partners. <u>Have a look at the resource page</u>.

Faith & Pollution Action

Following the adoption of UNEA Resolution 5/14 entitled "<u>End plastic pollution: Towards an international</u> <u>legally binding instrument</u>", the Interfaith Working Group on Pollution has been following the INC process, having attended the first three sessions of Intergovernmental Negotiating Committee on Plastic Pollution (INC). 70 representatives of FBOs added their voice to the statement '<u>Stop plastic pollution and restore our</u> world: Faith communities call on UNEA 5.2 to agree to negotiate an ambitious, legally binding Treaty to tackle plastic pollution' and published a Catalogue demonstrating global related projects.

Beyond Formal Law: The Role of Ethics, Beliefs and Values in Amplifying Action against Plastic Pollution in Africa was organised in partnership with Strathmore University and the Konrad-Adenauer-Stiftung Rule of Law Programme exploring

- Alternative cosmologies in plastic governance in Africa: role of customs, ethics, beliefs and Religions,
- Non-formal law approaches to plastics governance in Africa: regional experiences, Role of stakeholders in shaping ethics, belief, and value systems for Plastics Governance in Africa: Indigenous People, local communities, children, youth, women
- How to take the Beyond Formal Law in Environmental Governance Initiative Forward.

Youth Engagement

The <u>Faith for Earth Youth</u> is a platform for Intergenerational Equity driven by Faith, Values and Ethics that places young people of faith in positions of leadership to advocate for positive change under the Faith for Earth Coalition.

Following the launch Faith for Earth Youth Council

Since the first meeting of the Youth Council 'Youth-Led Advocacy: Promoting Intergenerational Action for Nature' on International Youth Day 2022, the Youth Council have been meeting on a monthly basis to discuss their engagement at key events such as at the <u>Confluence of Conscience</u>: <u>Uniting Leaders for</u> <u>Planetary Resurgence</u>. Ms. Sobia Ibrahim, Chair of the Council represented the voice of interfaith youth under the Coalition.

Other engagement:

- Supported the launch of the Value Education Olympiad 2023 with a statement of support
- Supported the Council for World Mission at the <u>Interfaith Eco-spiritualities Global Consultation 2023</u> <u>Promotes Ecojustice and Inclusive Civil Society Engagement</u> seeking to identify ways to engage the youth network globally

Gender & the Environment

In April, <u>International Union of Superiors General</u> (UISG) invited Faith for Earth to establish how their 1,900 members representing 600,000 Sister worldwide, can strengthen institutional collaborations with UNEP. The resulting <u>Environment Policy 2023</u> set the baseline for their engagement at the UNFCCC COP28 (Faith Pavilion), with the KMGBF, and in other policy fora.

In October 2023 the Faith For Earth Coalition held a <u>thematic consultation on Gender Inclusive Climate</u> <u>Resilience at COP28</u>, as part of the Pre-COP Consultation series towards COP28, sharing the outcome of <u>The Wilton Park Dialogue, in partnership with Global One</u>: Women, Religion and Climate Change : Working together to move Faster on Climate Change; on the significant role that women can play as agents of climate change and how providing opportunities for women to participate in decision making can contribute to the development and implementation of efficient and long-lasting climate resilient policies.

Progress towards the development of an Interfaith Women's Council, or mechanism for continuous engagement is underway through the support of the Faith for Earth Coalition.

Capacity Building

'The Faith for Earth Coalition, the <u>Yale Forum on Religion and Ecology</u>, the <u>Parliament of the World's</u> <u>Religions</u>, and <u>United Religions Initiative</u> maintain an <u>interactive database</u> called <u>'Faith Action on the UN</u> <u>Sustainable Development Goals,'</u> featuring 86 <u>projects</u> as of 31 December 2023.

Online Courses with the International Dialogue Center (KAICIID)

The International Dialogue Centre (KAICIID) together with Faith for Earth, University of Peace (UPEACE), Lutheran World Federation (LWF), National Muslim Council of Liberia (NMCL), and Institut Superior de Ciències Religioses de Barcelona (ISCREB) unveiled a new e-learning course 'Engaging Faith Actors to Support the Implementation Process of the Sustainable Development Goals' designed to help religious leaders and faith-based organisations (FBOs) achieve greater understanding and engagement of the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs).

'<u>Faith, Environment and Climate Change</u>' is a free e-learning and training course formed of eight modules, each offering faith leaders, religious groups, faith-based organisations and other stakeholders a distinct approach to effectively engage and contribute to environmental thematic areas through different methodologies, models, tools, and other approaches.

KAICIID and the Coalition were pleased to moderate this course for 5 cohorts of 22 participants from UISG and the <u>Justice, Peace and Integrity of Creation (JPIC</u>), globally.
